

# Nebraska and Syracuse to Clash in Big Intersectional Game

## Missouri Valley Grid Champions to Show East

### Contest Between Wisconsin and Minnesota to Feature Games Played in Middle West This Week.

The intersectional clash between Nebraska, last year's champion of the Missouri Valley conference which bids fair to retain the title, and Syracuse on the latter's gridiron, the contest between Wisconsin and Minnesota at Minneapolis in the middle west and showings which Yale, Harvard and Princeton make in their weekly games will feature the list of football struggles scheduled for Saturday.

Nebraska is a powerful eleven this year, one which should complete its valley schedule without defeat. Under the able tutelage of Fred Dawson, former Princeton player, the Cornhuskers have showed well in the last two years. The team has a powerful running attack, is heavy and strong defensively. It will be a representative middle west eleven, which should test the strength of the New York team from start to finish.

**Dawson Has Heavy Eleven.**  
The team has been developed in a pleasing manner. Coach Dawson has been content to have the eleven win its games by well known tactics, but the real strength of the offense has not been shown this year. The former Princeton player has the reputation on this year's eleven who can execute his ideas and the team should give a clever exhibition of the close and open attack.

In the middle west, the game between Wisconsin and Minnesota should be the feature. While the Gophers were held to a 7-0 score by Northwestern, an unfortunate fumble in the third period deprived the Gophers of a victory. Up to this point, the Norsemen had all the best of play and are a far better team than this score indicates. Under the coaching of Bill Stauding the squad will improve and should reach the heights of development on the week-end.

On the other hand, Wisconsin has showed its strength in games already played. The Badgers did not engage in a battle in St. Paul, but in the Indiana contest and the two preliminary struggles Coach Richards showed beyond doubt he has the men to form a strong eleven. Ability of the veterans is so well known, combined with the work of the new men, that it will take the best Minnesota can produce to hold the Badgers. A defeat for Wisconsin will put it out of the championship race and practically every play taught will be used if the Badgers are pressed to win.

**Purple at Urbana.**  
Illinois, which gave the middle-west football world its first shock of the season by holding Iowa to an 8-7 score, and Northwestern to a 1-7 score in Urbana in another game of interest as far as the Western conference is concerned. Both have been defeated by Big Ten elevens, but they are sure to put up an interesting game to secure a higher rating at the close of the year.

In another game of note, Notre Dame, for years one of the leading elevens in the middle west, will meet Indiana on the former's field. Instead of playing at Indianapolis, as has been the usual custom, the team will play home and home games in the future. This struggle is one of the most important in the Hoosier state and a real battle always results. Indiana has been defeated by Minnesota and Wisconsin, but the team generally rises when it meets Notre Dame to play an even better football than in the future.

Purdue and Wabash will meet at Lafayette in another contest of note as far as the state of Indiana is concerned. Wabash, known in football circles as the "Little Giants," has been running rough shod over some opponents this year and will surely give the Boiler-makers a game.

**Michigan Title Contender.**  
Michigan, which bids fair to complete its schedule without defeat, will charge the Michigan Aggies at Ann Arbor. If the Wolverines get by this contest without serious injury they should be in a position to enter the last two games with championship claims. Minnesota with its championship claims. The usual number of games will be played in the Missouri Valley conference, and by elevens which do not belong to any association.

In the far east Harvard will take on Florida in a game of intersectional character. The Crimson had little trouble to defeat Centre, and indications are the other southern elevens will not furnish stiff opposition. Princeton which met Chicago last Saturday in one of the most important intersectional games of the year, will meet Brown at New Haven.

**Cowell at Ithaca.**  
Cowell, which has been playing good football all year, will meet Columbia at Ithaca, and Pennsylvania will clash with Alabama at Philadelphia. W. and J. and Lafayette will meet on the Polo grounds in New York, while the Army will play at Bonaventure. Other events of the season will also engage in the usual number of week-end contests.

On the Pacific coast, California, which should win the championship handsily, will meet Washington State at Berkeley. Andy Smith, former Penn player and coach, has mastered another powerful eleven, which appears the strongest of the conference elevens in the section.

## Hawkeyes Easily Trounce Purdue

Iowa City, Ia., Oct. 28.—University of Iowa displaying a fierce attack, showed 12,000 football fans here this afternoon that it is still very much in the running for the western championship when it steam-rolled over Purdue University, 35 to 6.

## Artificial Lake Proves Popular

The lagoon at Gatun Locks, Gatun, Canal Zone, Panama, is to have the finest swimming pool in Central America. The construction has already been started.

Hundreds have been swimming regularly in the largest artificial lake in the world which has a combination of fresh and salt water, but the equipment has been inadequate.

Swimming has been made more popular than ever by Homer Baker, physical director employed by the United States government. For several months Baker has supervised the swimming program of the 14th infantry, under command of Col. W. H. Oury. Practically every soldier was taught to swim and the whole regiment made a spectacular public exhibition of swimming recently.

Last spring Ethelda Beldrey, Olympic champion, made a tour to Panama and performed at Gatun lake. The turnout of spectators was one of the largest that ever assembled on the concrete sides of the great Gatun dam and the wing walls of the Gatun locks. Ethelda Beldrey's tour also helped to popularize the swimming.

The 14th infantry, under the command of Col. Goddard, will conduct a monster swimming meet with fully 100 contestants. Fully 20 events make up the program of events which will be held as a formal opening of the new swimming arena.

The pool will contain a 50-yard straightaway swimming course. Water polo championships and other aquatic features of importance will be held regularly at the Gatun swimming arena. A volunteer life saving corps is now being organized by Homer Baker.
