

Senate Record of His Colleague Read by Norris

North Platte Valley Interested in Vote of Senior Senator to Tax Them for Irrigation.

Southplatt, Neb., Oct. 27.—(Special Telegram.)—Pleading for the retirement of Senator Hitchcock, because he is "fundamentally wrong" and his heart is not with the cause of the people, Senator George W. Norris received an enthusiastic response from a large group of North Platte valley people in this city tonight.

Senator Norris read repeatedly from the Congressional Record to show how the vote of Hitchcock was ranged on the side of wealth just after election, and rarely was found in the interests of Nebraska people, except just before it was necessary for him to go before them for their votes.

Senator Hitchcock and Penrose voted together on the wealth and profits. "Norris declared. "They turned their backs upon the people and refused to tax those who were making the profits from the toll and sweat of the common people."

"Oh, yes," cried Senator Norris amid laughter and applause. "Mr. Bryan told the truth about Senator Hitchcock some time ago."

Absence From Roll Call. The senator referred to Hitchcock's repeated absence from roll calls, especially when there was a division of sentiment at home and it might affect him to express an opinion. He talked of his proneness to golf, and said that "if it was nice, shiny weather and golf playing was good, Hitchcock was not voting, the record showed."

Uses Government Funds. Senator Norris assailed Senator Hitchcock for using government funds to pay the World-Herald correspondent in Washington and his wife almost \$10,000, and for working against and voting against the zone postage rates on second-class matter, when he was financially interested.

North Bend Man Seriously Hurt in Drunken Row

Aged Bachelors Hold Drinking Bout—One Shot—Two Held in County Jail.

Fremont, Neb., Oct. 27.—(Special Telegram.)—Andrew Johnson, 64, in the Dodge county jail and William Jergen, 49, is believed dying with a bullet hole three-fourths of an inch from his heart, as a result of a shooting affray at North Bend Thursday night following a booze party. James Hebert, 79, third member of the wild orgy and only eyewitness of the shooting, is also being held at the county jail.

Choked with emotion as he nervously paced his cell, Johnson said that the wounded victim was one of his best friends and that he was unable to give any explanation for the shooting, except that he was under the influence of liquor. The three men, all bachelors, were at the Johnson home, where whisky was brought out for entertainment. In the course of the party Johnson and Jergen are said to have become involved in a dispute which ended in Johnson's disappearing into the house. He reappeared with an old-fashioned .32 revolver and fired one bullet, which lodged in Jergen's body.

None of the men realized at the time what had happened. Jergen complained of feeling sick. Johnson went to a neighboring home and staggered to the door, yelling that a man was dying at his home. Hebert left to summon a doctor. Boys discovered Jergen lying on the sidewalk near Johnson's home nearly two hours after the shooting occurred.
