

McAdoo Assailed for Omaha Speech by McCormick

Illinois Senator Fires Broadside, Quoting Records to Show Reckless Misrepresentation.

Washington, Oct. 31.—Replying to a speech delivered in Omaha by William G. McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury, in which he assailed criticism of his record in Washington by Senator Modell McCormick, Illinois, Senator McCormick, in a statement made public yesterday by the republican senatorial campaign committee, fired another broadside at the democratic leader.

"The report of McAdoo's Omaha speech," said Senator McCormick, "shows he is still as reckless in the misrepresentation of facts and the use of adjectives as he was in the waste of public money and the break of public promises when he held office. I forbear to call him a political hardener or political imbecile. The record speaks for itself. It is a matter of notoriety that he fled from New York to take temporary refuge in California, because he knew the New York democracy would hold him to his hope of advancement."

Record Will Show.

"The record, not mere assertions, will establish the truth or the falsehood of Mr. McAdoo's statements and misings. Mr. McAdoo, next to Mr. Wilson, was the most prominent member of an administration, which promising peace took us unprepared into a war in which Mr. Wilson, by the stenographic record, has testified he would have joined the country despite the democratic campaign of 1916.

"That administration was responsible for the inflation and the consequent deflation of which Mr. McAdoo himself has held its reserve board responsible.

"The records, the multitudinous records, show the appalling loss in railroad operation had upon the United States this year by the railroad administration organized by Mr. McAdoo.

"That railroad administration since has estimated that the increase in the cost of freight charges and the cost of railroad travel was \$3,000,000,000 a year, and then, after Mr. McAdoo's management of them, the railroads were run at a loss. Who wrecked the railroad business? Who hoisted the freight rates? Who busted the farmers?"

Back to Normal.

"When Woodrow Wilson left office, agriculture was prostrate, business paralyzed. There were 5,000,000 men out of work. That was not enough. They sought further to saddle on the country the league of nations.

"We have resumed business re-employed labor, rehabilitated agriculture and kept free from entangling alliances.

"Let us not be led back into the industrial depression from which the republican congress and administration has lifted us. Let us not be drawn into the hazardous and costly position from which the republican party saved us."

"Living Wage" Decision Attacked by Wharton

Chicago, Oct. 31.—Majority members of the United States labor board were condemned for their "living wage" opinion in a statement made public today by A. O. Wharton, one of the three members of the board's labor group, whose dissenting opinion on the wage decision for maintenance of way workers brought forth the "living wage" repudiation by the majority members Sunday.

Mr. Wharton declared the majority opinion of the railroad and public groups was "fallacious and contained untruths. In some places it presents alleged arguments which on their face are impossible.

"The majority statement speaks of a \$20,000,000 increase. It has given the maintenance of way men, on the same method of figuring, it cut their pay \$50,000,000 in the July 1 decision, so the railroads are still \$30,000,000 to the good.

"It speaks of the cost of living, but it does not explain how a laborer can support himself and family on \$41 a month."

Two Aviators Die in Plane Crash

Dead Men Thrown From Seats Into Narrow Channel Between Islands.

Honolulu, Oct. 31.—(By A. P.)—Lieut. Thomas V. Hynes and Sgt. Ross Owens, Sixth pursuit squadron, Luke field, were killed, and Capt. T. W. Allen and Lieut. A. F. Hebbard, Schofield barracks, were injured when two army airplanes collided yesterday.

Lieut. Hynes and Sgt. Owens were returning to Luke field from aerial gunnery practice. While attempting a landing their plane side-slipped and crashed into another piloted by Capt. Allen with Lieut. Hebbard as observer.

Hynes and Owens were thrown from their seats and fell about 200 feet into the narrow channel separating Luke field from the island of Oahu.

Capt. Allen came out of the crash with a dislocated hip and Lieut. Hebbard with a broken leg.

The body of the dead lieutenant was recovered shortly after the accident. Naval divers are attempting to locate the body of Sgt. Owens.

Hynes was one of the prominent contestants in the recent transcontinental army flight, finishing among the leaders. His home was in New York and he was unmarried. Capt. Allen's home is in Pittsfield, Ill. He has a wife and child in Honolulu. Hebbard has a wife and child now in the United States and his home is in Elizabeth, N. J. Owens was unmarried and his home was in New York.

Judge Wade Sends Seven Shopmen to Jail for Contempt

Holds That Boone (Ia.) Union Leaders Were Directly Responsible for Attack on Strikebreakers.

Des Moines, Oct. 31.—Seven striking shopmen from the Northwestern shops at Boone were found guilty yesterday of contempt of court for violating the government's injunction. Two leaders of the group were sentenced to three months in the county jail, while the other five received one month each from Federal Judge Martin J. Wade.

Judge Wade held that Charles P. Morris and L. R. Murphy, chairman of the strike committee, were directly responsible for the raid on strikebreakers at the Boone shops on the morning of September 19, when the union men were returning to work. These two union officials received sentences of three months each in the county jail at Boone. The other defendants, Fred Cummings, Joseph McGhee, Al Callum, William Behling and Ed Murphy, were given 30-day sentences in the county jail.

Declaring that the railroad company had no authority to consider the injunction automatically lifted when the men returned to work, even if they desired to do so, Judge Wade held that the injunction was still effective when the assaults on strikebreakers occurred and that the participants should be punished.

Bonds of \$1,000 each for the two strike committee chairmen and \$500 each for the others will be furnished, according to attorney John D. Denison, who defended the strikers. The case will be appealed to the circuit court of appeals.

Burglars Steal Safe in Glenwood; Get \$500

Glenwood, Ia., Oct. 31.—(Special)—The Glenwood filling station here, one block from the courthouse, was entered some time Sunday night and the safe stolen. The door of the office was opened apparently with a pick, the safe carried to the baseball grounds three blocks away and robbed of its contents. It contained \$500.

Two Killed, Four Hurt in Explosion

Tank Blows Up in Gasoline Filling Station at Knoxville Ia.

Knoxville, Ia., Oct. 31.—Two persons were killed and four others were seriously injured, two of them perhaps fatally, when a tank in a gasoline filling station exploded here last evening.

The dead are Marsh Black, 71, station employee, and Mrs. Leonard Bradley of Okaloosa, Ia.

The injured are Leonard Bradley, Richard Bradley, William Hamilton and James Mulky. Richard, 5, son of the Bradleys, is not expected to live and the recovery of Hamilton is doubtful.

The Bradleys were having the gasoline tank in their car filled when the explosion occurred. Mrs. Bradley was instantly killed. Bradley and his son were hurled across the street and the roof of the station was blown 20 feet in the air.

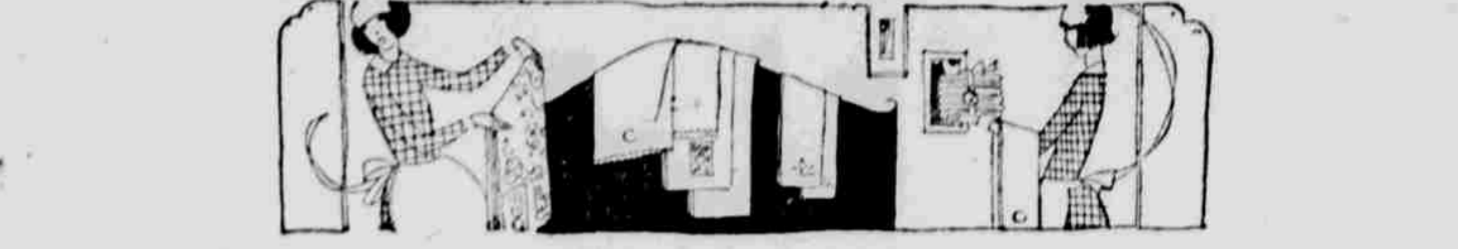
