## Omaha Priest Returns From Tour of Europe

### Pastor of St. Mary Magdalene Church Granted Audience With Pope While Visiting Abroad.

After a six months' tour abroad, Rev. Bernard Sinne, pastor of St. Mary Magdalene church, returned to Omaha Monday night at 11.

On Easter Monday, April 17, Father Sinne left Omaha, having been presented with a purse by his parishioners, for the first vacation he has enjoyed in 18 years. A few days later he sailed from New York on the "Olympic" and landed in Cherbourg, France. Passing through Paris and Cologne, Father Sinne arrived at Baden, Germany, his home, where he stayed several days. From there he traveled to Berlin, thence to Switzerland, where he visited Munich, Innsbruck and Lake Lucerne. In crossing the Alps into Italy, Father Sinne passed through the famous St. Gothard tunnel.

### Is Heal Father.

Upon his arrival in Rome he secured an audience with Pope Pius XI. "The holy father," said Father Sinne, "is a real father in every respect, and though an Italian by birth, speaks German fluently. He is much depressed because of the countless appeals which are constantly coming in to him from priests in the various countries suffering from political disorders."

In speaking of the attitude of Europeans towards America, Father Sinne remarked:

"The people across the water see in America their salvation, not because of the lavish way they spend money in Europe, but because of their generosity."

### Taxes Decreasing, Governor Shows

#### McKelvie Defends Code Before Large Open Air Meeting at Norfolk.

Norfolk, Neb., Oct. 31.—(Special Telegram)—Governor Samuel R. McKelvie, speaking to a large crowd of men and women during an open air meeting this afternoon, defended the civil administrative code, quoted figures to show that taxation over the state is being decreased and gave the names of many Madison county farm owners whose taxes have been reduced since 1921.

The governor declared the rainmaker candidate for governor on the democratic ticket promises to show tax reductions upon the people of Nebraska and repeal the code and return to constitutional government if elected. The governor said Bryan fails to say anything about how he is going to accomplish these promised tax reductions. He inferred Bryan wants to return to the old wasteful, inefficient system of administration under boards and commissions, or that he will transfer activities over the code to constitutional officers other than the governor.

What would he expect the governor to do after all of the activities for which he is directly responsible had been removed from his jurisdiction, the governor asked.

In closing his address the governor highly praised Senator Charles Randall of Randolph, republican candidate for governor, who he declared has labored in Nebraska over 35 years and has earned every penny of his money by the sweat of his brow. He declared Randall would make an ideal business governor for Nebraska, that he would be economic and would conduct a business administration because he has interests of Nebraska at heart, while Charles Bryan of Lincoln is a professional politician.

### Thieves Returned to Reform School

#### Paroles of Fremont Youths Who Boasted Theft of 19 Autos, Are Revoked.

Fremont, Neb., Oct. 31.—(Special Telegram)—Paroles of William McGuire, 14, and Blanchard Heemer, 14, Fremont youths, who boastfully admitted the theft of 19 automobiles within the last few weeks, have been revoked by Judge Waldo Wintersteen. The lads were returned to the Kearney reform school today.

The youthful bandits made a hobby of stealing cars of all makes in and around Fremont. They used the machines for joy rides until they were wrecked. One car was abandoned only to permit them to steal another one. Their wild career ended when caught at Schuyler following the robbery of an oil station in Fremont, where they stopped to secure gas for a stolen machine.

Both lads had been sentenced for stealing some time ago, but were paroled from the bench pending their good behavior.

## Victim of Drunken Brawl Dies of Wound

Fremont, Neb., Oct. 31.—(Special Telegram)—William Jurging, 41, victim of a drunken brawl and shooting affray at North Bend last Thursday, succumbed to a bullet wound at 4 this morning. The bullet pierced Jurging's breast, three-fourths of an inch from his heart.

County officials announced today that a post-mortem will be held and the body probed for the fatal bullet. Andrew Johnson, 69, held in Dodge county jail, charged with the shooting, is said to have confessed, stating he was intoxicated at the time Johnson said Jurging and himself had always been on the best of terms.

Charges will be filed following the post-mortem, Assistant County Attorney John Gumb announced to-day.

The locks on three doors had to be broken before entrance could be made into the supply room where the goods were stored. It is believed by officers that the job was done from the inside. The matter has been placed in the hands of the federal government.

## Measures Taken to Relieve Car Shortage

Pierre, S. D., Oct. 31.—It is the belief of the State Highway commission that definite steps have been taken to relieve the car shortage which exists in South Dakota and other western states and that results will shortly be felt as the result of a telegram just received by the commission from Donald D. Cunn of the car service division of the American Railway association, which reads as follows:

"In order to meet emergency existing northwest, central west and south west territory for auto and other food products, the car service division today issued most drastic instructions in their history for movements of box cars back to west lines to become effective immediately and will continue until further notice. Already one large eastern line has made up two trains of empties for movement to the western car service division. Fully equivalent need for box cars in your territory and believe instructions issued today will materially relieve car stringency now existing in the west."

The South Dakota commission has been making most strenuous efforts to bring about relief in this respect, having taken up the matter with the Interstate Commerce commission and the American Railway association.

## Farm Hand Badly Burned When Blow Torch Explodes

Beatrice, Oct. 31.—(Special)—Carl Olsen, employed on the James Jenkins farm near Blue Springs, was burned seriously when a torch he was using in welding an automobile part exploded, igniting his clothing. He ran to a stock tank and quenched the flames by throwing himself into the water. It is believed he will recover.

The explosion set fire to one of the farm buildings, which was destroyed.
