

### Beatrice Crowd Braves Storm to Hear Randall

**Tax Issue Discussed by Candidate for Governor—Spillman Tells of Randall, the Man.**

Beatrice, Neb., Nov. 1.—(Special Telegram)—An audience that filled Firemen's hall here tonight heard and applauded the speech of Charles H. Randall, candidate for governor, and that of O. N. Spillman, candidate for attorney general.

Mr. Randall was met at the train by E. L. Havelock and J. E. Barnard and escorted to the hall which was already filled in spite of the rainy weather.

He was introduced by H. E. Sackett. On the platform were H. P. Matton, Robert Poase and others.

**Discuss State Issues.**  
"I trust you will not be deceived into thinking that high taxes are due to the code law," said Senator Randall. "Do you know that if you discharged all the code secretaries you would pay only one cent less in every \$33 of your taxes?"

**Favors Law Enforcement.**  
Mr. Randall's declaration for law enforcement and the repeal of the indeterminate sentence was met with applause. "The only way to curb crime is to make the criminal feel that the law will deal strictly with him and demand full expiation of crimes," he said.

**Independent of Bosses.**  
Speaking of Mr. Randall, Mr. Spillman said: "He is independent of political bosses. There are no strings on him. He stands for economy and efficiency in running the state just as he has always practiced it in his own business. He has a record behind him that any man could be proud of. He is a man clear through. Everybody who sees him just once and looks into his eyes knows that he has an honest heart. He has always been the friend of the worker and the farmer. He makes no impossible promises, but his pledge is to give the people of Nebraska the very best practical service."

**Prospects Never Better.**  
J. M. Gillen, industrial commissioner of the Chamber of Commerce, estimated that \$1,600,000 more wages will be paid this year in Omaha manufacturing industries.

**Progress Steady.**  
"Following the depression which all knew existed last year, business has been conducted on a more careful and efficient basis," said Mr. Tancock. "Present indications are that when 1922 figures are compiled they will show an appreciable step from the low figures of 1921. Progress now is steady and there is every sign that it will continue."

**Fabric Market Strong.**  
The two large wholesale dry goods houses reported business on a more substantial basis than it has been any time since 1919. Markets for fabrics of all kinds are strong. The trade in shirts and overalls is more active than it has been at any time in two years and the production of women's garments is also largely increased over 1921.

### All Candidates Are Required to File Expense Accounts

**Statements Are Still Reaching  
Clerks of House at Rate  
of Almost 200  
Each Day.**

Washington, Nov. 1.—While less than one-half of the candidates for the senate have filed campaign expense statements, according to the count made by clerks, candidates for the house are still sending their reports at the rate of almost 200 a day.

The view was expressed by some senate officials that many candidates for that branch might accept the interpretation of the supreme court decision in the Newberry case by Attorney General Daugherty that they were not required to file. In a letter last year to Representative Luce, republican, Massachusetts, the attorney general, answering a specific inquiry as to the effect of the Newberry decision, said:
