Big Crowds Greet Simmons in Tour of Sheridan County

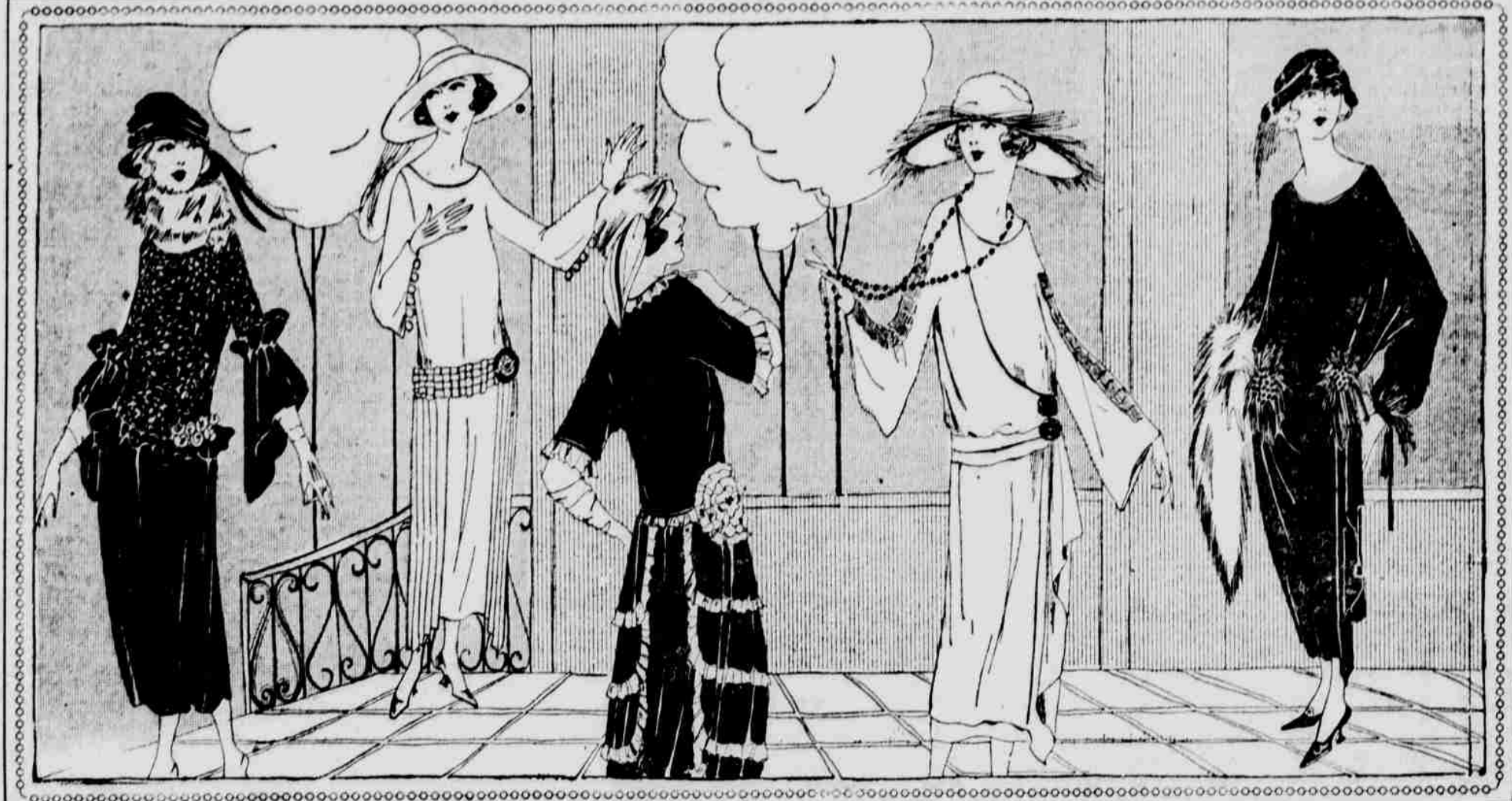
