The University of South Dakota football team will arrive in Omaha tomorrow in time to get one workout under its belt before tackling Creighton on the locals' field Saturday.

The Coyote lineup will be the same as that which beat South Dakota state to a 7 to 7 tie last Saturday.

Coach MacFarlane has spent the week in drilling the Hilltoppers in the fundamentals of the game, such as tackling, falling on the ball and running interference.

No big change has been made in the team's tactics, the coach said.

Van Akerken, star tackle, who has been out of the game a greater part of the season by injuries, will return to his old post at tackle and Kane, who has been playing in his place, will be moved back to left end.

Coach Pat Herron has been drilling his state university eleven all week in forward pass formations, and in view of Indiana's success with this style of play last Saturday in registering a 14 to 6 win over the Michigan Argies, followers of the Green and Crimson believe Indiana's best chances with Rockne's undefeated Irish will be by the forward pass route.

"Some years ago, I waited on you and a party of friends in Fort Wayne, Ind., and, after you had gone, I found a \$5 bill under the table. You paid for the luncheon and as nobody else had handed any money I figured the \$5 must have belonged to you. I thought I would run across you."

The letter was signed T. Martin, 4131 Jackson boulevard, Chicago.

Willard endorsed the money order and sent it back to Martin, thanking him and commending him on his honesty.

"I do not think I dropped that \$5, for in those days, they were too precious to be handled carelessly," said Willard.
