The Esch Cummins law has raised the toll paid in rates by the people 5800,000 000 a year. Mr. Howell stress. ed the fact that his opponent has at no time uttered a word that would in way alienate the support of his old friends, the railroad capitalists and Dinnagers.

The transportation problem," Mr. Blowell said, 'has been practically ignored by my opponent. Although he voted for the Esch-Cummins law, he now admits it must be amended, but is very vague as to how this act should be modified.

"He does not say that he is for the restoration of competition in railroad rates, nor did he piedge himself to back Senator Capper in his attempt to wipe out the minimum guarantee from the shipper on all railroad investments of 5 1-2 per cent. that was provided for in this law.

"True, this 51-2 per cent guarantee expired March 1, 1922, but after that the Interstate Commerce commission was to fix the rate of guarantee and the commission has since fixed the minimum rate at 5 3-4 per cent. As a nutter of fact, my distinguished opponent's expressions respecting this law are not such as will lose him the Note of a single railroad capitalist or manager. True, their votes are few, but their influence is great, great enough, throughout the country, to put over such an act as the Esch-Commins law,

"As evidence that such great influence can be exercised by a comparatively few voters of great wealth, consider this fact: a majority of the stock of the raffroads carrying 97 per cent of the traffic of this country, is owned by less than one millionth part of the people, or about \$,300 persons. In 1917 the government commandeered the people's money by the issuance of Liberty bonds, guaranteeing an in vestment return of from 31-2 to 43-4 per cent. At the same time the government commandeered the railroads of the country, guaranteeing to these \$,300 persons the average returns they had been receiving during the preceding three years.

Returns to Roads.

"These returns amounted to about as follows: For the milroads in the eastern district, 111-2 per cent; for the southern district, 121-3 per cent and for the western district, 10 percent. The guarantees to some individual railroads ran as follows:

Burlington, 22 per cent; Pittsburgh New Orleans & Texas Pacific, 45 per cent: Bessemer & Lake Erie, 647 per "How do these returns compare to

vailed shortly after the enactment of the Esch-Cummins law.

From a given point, it cost to ship a-car load of corn to Chicago in 1913, \$32; in 1920, \$53; in 1921, after the emactment of this law, \$187; an increase of 584 per cent over 1913.


