Lincoln, Nov. 4. - Senator Norris bluntly accused Senator Hitchcock, in a speech at a luncheon here Friday f attempting to lie his way tack into he senate and declared that there is ittle difference between the debauchery of Newberry and the lying deceit of Hitcheoeic. He added that if he had to choose between the two he would prefer the Newberry way. He said that Hitchcock was spending an immense sum to get back, enough to make Newberry look like 30 cents, If all were reported.

Benator Norris took up an adver tisement in Hitchcock's interest addressed to the farmers, in which he cla)med credit for various measures In the interest of agriculture, Norris said that Hitchcock knew so little about what agricultural measures were passed; that he did not know Norris, as a member and chairman of the agricultural committee, was in a position to denounce his claim as lies. He said it was a lie that Hitchcock has a reputation for being a friend of agriculture.
