

Norris Attacks Senior Senator in Lincoln Talk

Bluntly Accuses Colleague of Trying to Lie His Way Back Into Office - Charges Newberryism.

Lincoln, Nov. 4.—Senator Norris bluntly accused Senator Hitchcock, in a speech at a luncheon here Friday, of attempting to lie his way back into the senate and declared that there is little difference between the delinquency of Newberry and the lying delinquency of Hitchcock.

Senator Norris took up an advertisement in Hitchcock's interest addressed to the farmers. In which he claimed credit for various measures in the interest of agriculture. Norris said that Hitchcock knew so little about what agricultural measures were passed; that he did not know Norris, as a member and chairman of the agricultural committee, was in a position to denounce his claims as lies.

He said it was a lie that Hitchcock has a reputation for being a friend of agriculture. "God have mercy on the soul of the man or woman responsible for the publication of those falsehoods," he said.

He said Hitchcock's failure to be present at one roll call cost the farmers of irrigated Nebraska one-half the cost of the Pathfinder dam, which Norris had proposed should be paid out of a Mississippi river flood appropriation because every foot of water impounded by the Pathfinder did not go to augment that flood.

West Virginia Coal Men Arrange Price Reduction

Washington, Nov. 4.—Federal Fuel Distributor Conrad E. Spens, when he closed his office last night, had received no final answer from Illinois and Indiana coal operators to his request for a voluntary cut in the price of coal at the mines. Mr. Spens said he expected to receive word Saturday morning at the latest, however, and that some announcement regarding maximum mine prices for Illinois and Indiana probably would be made shortly thereafter.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 4.—John M. Owley, national commander of the American Legion, is what he declared to have been his first official speech as national legion head, here last night outlined the program which the organization has before it for the year, scored the hospitalization program carried out so far for the disabled veterans and declared his stand in favor of adjusted compensation.

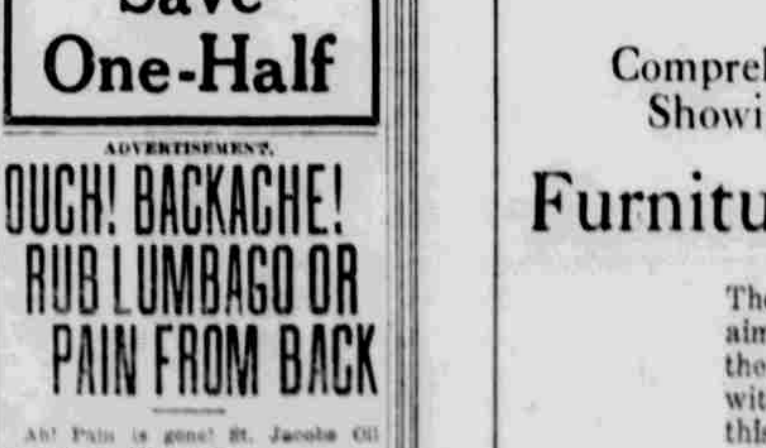

Many Applications for Action Under New Tariff Law

Majority of Requests for Changes Under Section Giving President Right to Increase Duties.

Washington, Nov. 4.—Applications to the tariff commission for action under the flexible tariff provisions of the new Fordney-McCumber law now total nearly 100. More than half of these have been received since the publication of regulations governing procedure before the commission last week.

Most of the applications are for changes in duty under section 315 of the new law, which authorizes the president to increase or decrease duties by not more than 50 per cent. There are a few applications for the imposition of the retaliatory duties under section 316 relating to unfair methods of competition in the importation of foreign goods and under section 317 relating to discrimination of other countries against commerce of the United States.

It was stated today at the tariff commission that a preliminary investigation of some of the more important applications may be completed within about a week. No hearings on any of the applications are in prospect before December and possibly not before January.

Railroads Must Keep Equipment in Repair

Washington, Nov. 4.—(Special Telegram.)—Attorney General Daugherty is about to serve notice on the railroads they must keep their equipment up to standard.

The attorney general's decision is the result of representations made to him by railroad men who claim the demoralization of equipment is much worse than has been understood. This has been in part due to the congestion of traffic and car shortage which is just now hitting the west with tremendous force.

Mrs. Catt in Budapest

Budapest, Nov. 4.—On the invitation of Hungarian feminists, Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, the American suffrage leader, has arrived here to study the effects of woman suffrage in Hungary.

Nine Des Moines City Employees Are Indicted

State Investigators Say Irregularities With Funds Involve More Than \$100,000.

Des Moines, Ia., Nov. 4.—Nine former city employees were indicted yesterday on 21 counts of forgery, false pretenses and conspiracy in connection with alleged irregularities of disposing of city funds. The irregularities are said by state investigators to involve more than \$100,000.

Harry X. Miller, brother of former city superintendent of safety, Marshall Miller, who formerly was superintendent of garbage disposal, was mentioned in 12 counts.

Two Bombing Airplanes Damaged in Forced Landing

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 4.—Two large bombing army planes en route from Langley field, Va., to Kelly field, Tex., were severely damaged when forced by engine trouble to land in Missouri yesterday, according to a report by military observers in a third plane which landed safely at Richards field. The occupants of the two planes were slightly bruised and scratched but otherwise not injured.

One of the bombers was forced to land at Napoleon, Mo., 30 miles from Kansas City. The other went aground at Troy, Mo. The planes were on the way to Kelly field for use in the advance bombing school conducted by the army.

Irish Barracks Attacked

Belfast, Nov. 4.—The military barracks at Ardee, County Louth, was fired at by republicans today, but owing to the great strength of the building, the shells of which are five feet thick, the assault failed.
