

Republican Victory Is Forecasted

Nebraska's Election Is Regarded as National Event—All Eyes on Middle West.

Campaign Issues Clear

From a national standpoint, the most interesting and important elections Tuesday will occur in the middle-west. The influence of this agricultural section, particularly in the United States senate, has grown steadily in the last few years.

In Nebraska, the republican party is confident of replacing Senator Gilbert M. Hitchcock with H. H. Howell, as well as electing a republican governor and the entire ticket.

When Senator Hitchcock returned to Nebraska to campaign for a third term, he found the farmers and business men in arms against the high freight rates levied under the Cullum-Hitchcock law.

McAdoo Makes Mistake. When William G. McAdoo appeared in Omaha to speak in behalf of Hitchcock's candidacy, he made the tactical mistake of denouncing the Enoch Cullum law and was reminded by a voice from the audience that Hitchcock had voted for it.

For years Bryan had attacked Hitchcock as the tool of the "wets," as well as a leader of the reactionaries. The more faithful his followers were, the more surprised they were to witness the sudden change in the senator's attitude.

Collecting Many Fines. "I confiscated automobiles containing whisky that were sold for \$21,146. In co-operation with the highway department I collected delinquent mobile licenses amounting to \$40,800; in co-operation with federal law enforcement officials I collected fines in the amount of \$194,872; in co-operation with local sheriffs and other peace officers I recovered and returned automobiles to owners in the value of \$129,468; it made 1,406 investigations regarding the illegal sale of liquor; seized 234 stills, and has indexed 7,100 automobiles that have been stolen in various parts of the United States.
