## Adams Pleased With Retention of G. O. P. Control District.

Republican National Chairman Issues Statement on Election-Gives Reasons

### for Outcome.

Washington, Nov. 9 .-- Retention of republican majorities in both senate and house was declared to be "very gratifying" to republican leaders in statement issued by John T. Adams, chairman of the republican national committee, reciting some of the causes which he considered respon sible for the outcome of Tuesday's riection

The spirit of unrest following after the world war, an unusual prominence of local issues over national issues in many states, the use of "fake" issues to befog the general situation and the natural tendency of a large class of people to vote for a change in off years were credited by the party chairman with responsibility for the paring down of the repub lican majorities of two years ago.

### Political Off Year.

"The political off year," said the statement, "always witnesses a decided reaction from the majorities of a presidential election. With very few exceptions, the congress elected in off years has been of opposite political faith to the administration. In view of this the refention of control of congress by the republicans this year is very gratifying.

"This is especially true in view of the spirit of unrest which prevails throughout this country as an aftermath of the great war. Such a spirit always visits its dissatisfaction upon whatever party may be in power. At such times, the only thought that appeals to a great class of people is to vote for a change,' regardless of the issues involved or the records of the contending parties. 




