

Creighton Backs Plow Way to 13-0 Victory Over Light Midland Eleven

Light Lutheran Aggregation Holds Hilltoppers to 13-0 Score

"Rudy" Yechout Stars in Blue's Victory Over Undefeated Nebraska Conference Eleven—Captain Horn of Visitors Plays Good Game.

Creighton university's football machine rolled to another victory on Creighton Athletic field yesterday when it crushed the light Midland college team of Fremont under a 13 to 0 score.

Displaying a smashing line attack that punctured the opposition whenever it hit and opening up with a brand of passing in the second half that resulted in one touchdown, Creighton showed some of its old-time football "fight" when it downed the Lutherans.

Light drizzle fell throughout the contest, making good field running impossible and long passing a hard feat to accomplish. But in spite of the weather conditions, the handful of spectators were treated to a stubbornly fought game.

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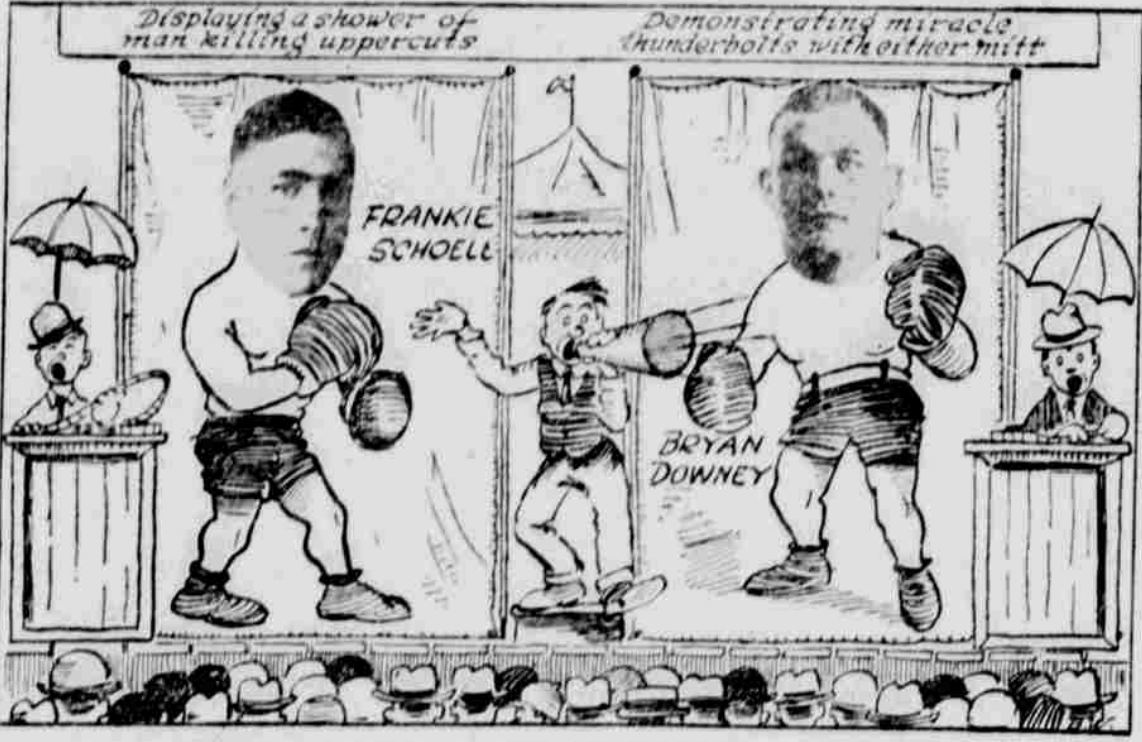
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Main Attractions for Monday's Fight Show

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Chicago Remains in Big Ten Race by Beating Ohio

Ohio Stadium, Columbus, O., Nov. 11.—Chicago's Maroons cling to their chance for the conference championship today by throwing the third straight defeat Ohio has suffered and finally breaking the Ohio hoodoo by winning a heavily fought game, 14 to 9.

Held at bay through the first half with the inspired Buckeyes fighting for their football honor, the Maroons came back in the second half and crashed their way to one touchdown.

It looked then as if the Maroons might, in spite of their greater power, throw away the game, even as they did the one to Princeton, for Ohio, during the second half, was ripping the way to another score, when, with two opponents leaping for the same ball in midfield, the Chicago man grabbed the flying pigskin and Ohio's rush was stopped.

Chicago was the better team, stronger, more resourceful and faster. Twice after Ohio collapsed forward passes, the receivers were so slow they were dragged down from behind, and nothing else saved Chicago from a 15 to 14 defeat and another Princeton non-victory.

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Iowa Humbles Gophers, 28 to 14

Iowa City, Ia., Nov. 11.—Featured by the terrific running attack of Iowa in the first half when it scored all its points, and the remarkable fighting spirit of Minnesota in the last two periods, the Hawkeyes, contenders for western conference football honors, defeated the Gophers today before 25,000 homecoming fans, 28 to 14.

It was a great game, featured by sparkling tackling and blocking. In fact, the men played so aggressively that time had to be called 10 times in the first two quarters and some of the players, including Parkin, the first low-quarter back, had to be assisted from the gridiron.

At the end of the first half, Iowa led 28 to 7 and to appearances, it looked as if Minnesota would be badly beaten. Between halves, however, Coach Spalding gave his men a severe talk, corrected their faults with the result they came back in the second half and completely outplayed last year's Big Ten champions.

The Gophers penetrated the Hawkeye line for consistent gains and executed a beautiful forward pass which resulted in their second score in the final quarter.
