

Democrats Start War Cry Against Ship Subsidy Bill

All Signs Point to Bitter Fight Over Measure at Extra Session—Filibuster Expected.

By GRAFTON WILCOX. Washington, Nov. 11.—With the 6th congress called in special session for Monday, November 20, the fight over the pending ship subsidy bill which will be the most important measure discussed, has already begun.

With Representative Edmonds, Pennsylvania, leading republicans member of the merchant marine committee, and A. D. Lasker, chairman of the United States shipping board, in conference on plans for pushing the subsidy bill, Cordell Hull, chairman of the democratic national committee, voiced the democratic war cry against the bill.

All signs point to a bitter fight with the prospect that the democrats will endeavor to filibuster against the measure.

Criticism Harding. "By calling a special session of congress to meet November 20, for the purpose of passing a ship subsidy bill, President Harding has shown that he has not profited by the lesson of Tuesday's great democratic victory, which contained not only a rebuke for the republican congress and administration, but for himself as well," said Chairman Hull.

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Tax Revision May Be Issue Before Next Congress

Proposals Likely to Come From Both Majority and Minority Parties, in Opinion of Leaders.

Washington, Nov. 11.—(By A. P.)—The pressing of several important tax revision proposals in the Sixty-eighth congress was forecast by some of the "progressive republicans" and the democrats, on the basis of the sharp minorities in the house and senate as a result of Tuesday's elections.

Chief among the tax problems is an impost on the undistributed surplus of corporations affecting also stock dividends. Such a tax is favored by the democrats, in the view of Representative Oldfield of Arkansas, the minority whip.

Mr. Oldfield also expressed the opinion that the democrats would favor enactment of the excess profits tax, but in a modified form, increased in importance as a graduated scale, and the imposition of a gift tax in an effort to reach those of wealth seeking to avoid the payment of high surtaxes, through gifts of money to relatives.

These taxes have been opposed heretofore by administration officers who have made it plain that they have not in mind any general revision of the existing revenue law, which was enacted late last year and which became generally effective January 1.

Proponents of the proposed changes expressed confidence, however, that with the change in the house membership in the new congress they would have more than an even chance of success.

"Progressive" republican leaders, in their estimates of strength, count on almost solid democratic support for their proposals and likewise the democrats look to the left wing of the majority party for support for their program.

There seems to be more doubt in the minds of these leaders about the situation in the senate, but they expressed hope that with an increased democratic and republican "progressive" vote there a revision plan could be put through.

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Democrat to Get More Members on House Committees

Representative Green of Iowa in Line for Chairmanship of Ways and Means Body.

Washington, Nov. 11.—By cutting down the republican majority in the house, democrats in the next congress will obtain larger representation on all of the big committees by which the most important legislation is framed.

Leaders of both parties began figuring today on the new alignment.

As it now stands, the ways and means committee which reported the revenue, tariff and bonus bills, consists of 25 members, 17 republicans and eight democrats.

Because of the large number of sub-committees, which prepare the supply bills, the appropriations committee, consisting of 23 republicans and 12 democrats, is expected to stand at about that ratio.

But all committees now composed of 15 republicans and six democrats probably will go on a 12 to nine footing.

The rules committee, all powerful of itself, generally stands eight to four, regardless of majority.

Defeat of Chairman Volstead of the judiciary committee will make Representative Graham, Pennsylvania, chairman.

All bills relating to prohibition are considered by the judiciary committee. Mr. Graham was among the few members who refused to vote one way or the other when the Volstead measure was up for passage some years ago.

Representative Grist, Pennsylvania, stands in line for chairmanship of the postoffice committee in place of Chairman Stearnson, defeated in the Kansas primary.

Under the seniority system, Representative Snell, New York, will be head of the rules committee, succeeding Chairman Campbell, defeated in the Kansas primary.

Baby, Brought to Life at Morgue, Succumbs

Infant Actually Died Today After Having Apparently Expired Early Wednesday Morning.

Oakland, Cal., Nov. 11.—The 15-day-old girl baby of Mr. and Mrs. George Kayne actually died today after having apparently expired early Wednesday morning, only to be revived when it showed a spark of life in a funeral establishment.

A careful examination by both the attending doctor and the undertaker today determined beyond all doubt that the baby was dead.

The undertaker is the one who revived the baby on Wednesday. Today the body was prepared for burial and the funeral was set for tomorrow.

Condition of Mrs. Harding Shows Marked Improvement Washington, Nov. 11.—Marked indications of improvement in the condition of Mrs. Harding were announced by her physician, Dr. Gen. Charles E. Sawyer, who said that she now was able to stand and to take a few steps.

Dr. Sawyer indicated that he felt quite encouraged over the progress his patient is making.

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Leader of Irish Rebels Captured

Erskine Childers and David Robinson Taken by Free State Troops.

Dublin, Nov. 11.—Erskine Childers, reckoned one of the most dangerous men among the Irish rebels, was captured early this morning in County Wicklow.

Childers and Robinson are both Englishmen. Childers served with a London regiment during the Boer war. Later he wrote several books and has been engaged occasionally in work for the colonial offices.

There was considerable rifle and revolver fire again today upon Fort Jingo and Wellington barracks and troops in O'Connell street were sniped at from rooftops, but the only known casualty was one national slightly wounded.

Du Pont de Nemours Company to Increase Capital Stock Wilmington, Del., Nov. 11.—E. I. DuPont de Nemours & Co. plan to increase their authorized common capital stock from \$50,000,000 to \$100,000,000.

It was announced by the authorization of 200,000 additional shares at par value of \$100 a share, and to transfer a part of its surplus to the capital account by declaring a 20 per cent dividend.

The directors at a meeting today called a special meeting of the stockholders for December 4 to vote on the proposed new issue.
