

Free State's Foes Increase Attack on Government

Rebels Declare Free State Already Beaten — Propaganda Campaign Carried on in Dublin.

Dublin, Nov. 14.—(By A. P.)—The current increase of activity of armed forces opposing the Irish government is attributed to reunion of the political and military wings of republicanism. This, among other things, resulted in the reappointment of Eamon De Valera as president of the Irish republic with a council of state claiming sole legitimate authority in Ireland.

There is a wide divergence between the accounts published by the government of its successes against the irregulars and those put out by De Valera's party. The government claims to be winning and gradually restoring order when De Valera's followers record severe losses they are inflicting and assert that the free state is already beaten.

Propaganda War. These assertions are made partly in propaganda sold upon the streets and partly through large inscriptions

painted nightly all over Dublin, on lamp posts, bill boards and bridges. The civil guard and the metropolitan police pace up and down all the thoroughfares, but they seem unable to check these manifestations of Ireland's internal dissension.

Every day government agents go about and smear paint solidly over the inscriptions, but the next morning they appear again.

The intensification of activity by the irregulars is supposed to be partially aimed at the British political crisis with the design of bringing home to the British the thought that the Irish question remains unsettled despite the treaty. When the next British parliament assembles and the constitution of the free state is submitted for ratification it is anticipated that the activities of the irregulars will be further intensified.

Republican Forces Defeated. Except in the south, all large bodies of republican forces have been dispersed in a wholesale manner by national troops, but small bands are able to inflict constant losses and humiliation upon the government by their activities in Dublin and elsewhere. Repressive power has been granted to the government by the Irish parliament, but the republicans have never believed these powers would be fully exercised, and so far their forecasts have been for the most part accurate.

New Railway Laws Outlined by Hoover

(Continued From Page One.) Agriculture is an area of wide disparity between the farmers' income and that of industry, while at the same time railway earnings are not large enough to assure railway expansion.

"Some classes and areas of traffic are carried," the report declares, "at actual loss, others are carried at lower rates than the relative value of the commodities warrant; and a series of scientific upward readjustments should be made in some cases in order to give the railways and the shippers of primary commodities and agricultural produce some relief."

Wage control and strike prevention phases of the act are considered unsatisfactory by Mr. Hoover on the ground that failure of the local adjustment boards for direct contact between employers and employees has thrust all labor disputes upon the railroad labor board, resulting in practically government fixing of all wages and conditions of labor.

"There can be no question," the report says, "that action in some direction is imperative if industry and commerce are not to be further strangled by a shortage of transportation. Whatever may have been the sins of railway finance in the last generation we are not only suffering from them but we have maintained an attitude of bitterness in our public relationship to our railways for which we pay thrice

over in prevention of their proper development. We must have increased transportation if we are to maintain our growing productivity. We must therefore find a way out of the cycle of systematic starvation of a large part of our mileage and the denudation of our railway managers of their responsibility and initiative."

O'Connor Valley Recovering From Fall in Crop Prices. Among the visitors at the stock yards yesterday was John Gibbons of the O'Connor valley, who was looking over the market.

Mr. Gibbons said the valley was recovering from the fall of prices for products in 1920 and 1921 and that confidence in future markets on all crops was growing.

"Conditions in general look much better this year than they did last fall in Greeley county," said Mr. Gibbons. "I think there will be a large number of hogs from that section shipped to the local market in the very near future."

Preliminary to Lausanne Meet Solved by Notes

Curzon to Meet Poincare in Paris—Mussolini to Join Pair Sunday—War Dangler Less.

London, Nov. 14.—(By A. P.)—The troublesome question of how a meeting of the allies could be arranged before the Lausanne peace conference for the purpose of outlining the allied program, as Great Britain has insisted, has been solved as a result of an exchange of messages by the chancellors at Paris, Rome and London.

Neither Premier Poincare of France nor Premier Mussolini of Italy can leave his capital for a conference elsewhere before proceeding to Lausanne, it has developed, but Lord Curzon, the British secretary of foreign affairs, has arranged to see Premier Poincare in Paris on the way to Lausanne, probably on Thursday, and the conversation will be continued on the train to Lausanne. Premier Mussolini will join his colleagues for a preliminary meeting at Lausanne Sunday.

Genoa reports that the Turks would refuse to enter the Lausanne conference if the allies made any preliminary agreements evoked the statement of official circles here that little importance was attached to this.

Official messages from Constantinople today indicated the situation there was somewhat easier. A news agency dispatch from Constantinople, dated Monday, said the allies had handed Rodosto over to the nationalists and that Adrianople would be turned over Sunday.

Party Leaders Shy at Plan of Wilson

Democrats Not Enthusiastic Over Proposal to Revive League as Political Issue.

By GRAFTON WILCOX Omaha Bee Leased Wire. Washington, Nov. 14.—Woodrow Wilson's attempt to regain leadership of the democratic party on a league of nations platform shows little prospect of success.

The response to his Saturday speech has been distinctly unfavorable. Democratic senators, returning to Washington, shied at the suggestion of reviving the league as a political issue and declared that it was only a negligible factor in Tuesday's election.

Mr. Wilson's league talk had a disconcerting effect upon them. They are anxious to form an alliance with the radical and progressive republicans but they realize that the surest way of keeping the republicans united is to resurrect the league. The progressives, notably Senator Johnson, California; Senator Borah, Idaho; La Follette, Wisconsin, and Norris, Nebraska, are strongly irreconcilable and would promptly line up with the regulars if the league became a major issue again.

Legion Chief Addresses Ex-Soldiers at Kearney

Kearney, Neb., Nov. 14.—(Special) —The foremost fight of the American Legion today is for proper hospitalization and rehabilitation, is the gist of an address delivered here Sunday by Col. Alvin Owsley, national commander of the American Legion, to the local legion post.

The speaker said that disarmament should be discontinued, until other countries who accepted the Washington conference treaties have shown a desire and readiness to follow them. He opposed cancellation of the European debt, stating that Europe should be as willing to pay the debt as she was to shoulder it.

Hotel Company Plans Suit to Determine Assessment

Grand Island, Neb., Nov. 14.—(Special Telegram)—Owners of the uncompleted North American Hotel company building are planning a "friendly" suit in court to determine the proper assessment for the completed improvements on the real estate during the past few years, as based on section 5425 of the state's statutes. This assessment is for \$100,000, while the property has recently sold for less than \$70,000 at both a public and a private sale.

Eight-Inch Fall of Snow Blocks Roads at Callaway

Callaway, Neb., Nov. 14.—(Special) —The worst snowstorm of the season visited this community Sunday. Roads are blocked and practically all travel has been stopped. About eight inches of snow has fallen.

To Sink More Wells. Madison, Neb., Nov. 14.—(Special) —At a meeting of the city commissioners it was decided to sink four or five more wells near the Zimmerman springs plant in order to secure a more abundant supply of water.

Madison County Opens. Madison, Neb., Nov. 14.—(Special) —November term of district court opened yesterday with Judge William V. Allen presiding. The time was occupied today with assignment of cases.

Legion Homecoming. Paterson, N.J., Nov. 14.—(Special) —A homecoming celebration was held here on Armistice day by the local American Legion and the Paterson Public Service club. The altitudes were a large crowd.

Winston Churchill Booted Out of Hall

London, Nov. 14.—Winston Churchill, who is recovering from an operation for appendicitis, was hissed and booed out of a hall last night when he attempted to address a meeting at Dundee from an invalid chair.

The disturbances evidently were systematically arranged by communists, who have considerable strength at Dundee. Crowds assembled before the hall and attempted to rush the doors when they were opened, but the intruders were forced back by police with drawn clubs.

Mr. Churchill managed to squeeze in through the back door, but he had no sooner appeared on the platform than there was a storm of cat calls and hisses. Then the great crowd took up the old refrain, "Tell me the old story," effectually preventing the former minister of the colonies from making himself heard.

Finally Mr. Churchill was forced to retire and the agitators left the building singing communist songs.

Murderer Convict Expected to Die

Mexican in Federal Prison Runs Amuck, Stabbing Captain and Six Guards.

Leavenworth, Kan., Nov. 14.—Joe Martinez, Mexican murderer convict, who shortly before noon today fatally stabbed A. H. Leonard, captain of the guards at the federal penitentiary here, was said to be in a serious condition in the hospital where he was taken after he had stabbed Leonard and killed six other guards.

Martinez was captured by guards only after he had been shot and after he had been pelted with coal in the coal bunker where he hid after the stabbing. Hospital authorities state that he has a fractured skull, and may die.

Captain Was Fearless. In the opinion of Warden W. I. Biddle, the man fancied he had a grievance against Leonard, fashioned the knife from a piece of steel and used the improvised weapon at the first opportunity. Leonard was looked

upon in the prison as a fearless guard and it is said numerous threats to "get him" were made by prisoners. He is survived by a wife and three children. After prisoners had been taken to the barber shop this morning, one of them warned William Doldge, a guard, that Martinez was carrying a knife. Doldge demanded the knife. Martinez replied by stabbing the guard. Joseph Durkin, another guard, approached and attempted to disarm the apparently crazed Mexican. Martinez stabbed him.

Stabs Left to Right. Captain Leonard then rushed in and tried to obtain the knife. Martinez stabbed him in the left side, the blade entering the heart. Captain Leonard staggered a few feet and fell.

"He got me," Leonard said to a fellow officer. By this time other guards had been attracted to the scene. Martinez was stabbing right and left. He knifed Guards Martin Lenay, George Logan, M. F. Dunkel and James Galvin. The last two names were only slightly wounded. The condition of Doldge, Lenay and Durkin, while serious, is not thought to be critical.
