

Rain Not to Halt Creighton Fete of Homecoming

Only Affair on Program the Weather May Change Is Barbecue—Large Attendance Expected.

Rain or shine, Creighton homecoming day exercises will be held today, according to schedule. With a number of group committee meetings yesterday and last night, final touches were put on arrangements for the celebration, according to General Chairman Edward F. Leary.

"One hundred and forty-three committees have worked on the plans for the homecoming day," said Chairman Leary. "Every graduate of Creighton has been invited by letter, in person, by telegraph or telephone, to come back home for this one day." There will be something moving every minute of the day in connection with the homecoming. From the minute the morning trains begin arriving at 7 and the homecomers are met at the depot by 16 young women under the chairmanship of Mrs. James H. Hanley, until the orchestra plays the last note for the dance towards midnight, things will move at a rapid pace.

Alumni to Register.
The first official act, after the welcome at the railroad stations, will be the registration of the alumni at the university. The registration includes the distribution of the official badges. At 10:30 in the morning the student union will stage the "Creighton circus" in the university auditorium. Then will come the barbecue, for which nearly a ton and a half of roast beef has been provided under the direction of Hugh Gillespie. If the weather permits, the barbecue will be held on the campus next to the astronomical observatory. In case of rain, it will be transferred to the basement of the gymnasium. The roll call starts at 1:30 and the name of every member of every class ever formed at Creighton since the

university was organized, will be called.

Game at 2:30.
And at 2:30 the football game with the Michigan Aggies will open. Omaha football fans have been looking forward to this as the best game of the Omaha season and one of the biggest games in which Creighton has ever participated. Three sections of the football stands have been reserved for the alumni, and from the number of acceptances received by A. A. Schabinger, athletic director of Creighton university, every seat will be taken and 2,500 to 3,500 fans will be forced to stand.

The celebration will close with a dance and a smoker. The student union is giving the dance, the university the smoker. The younger students are expected to attend the dance, while the smoker is expected to draw the "old timers."

Sometime during the evening the winner of the loving cup will be announced at the dance and the presentation will be made immediately. "Homecoming" is to be an annual event at Creighton in the future. Mayor Dahman issued a proclamation yesterday in which he announced that alumni of Creighton were "welcome home."

Governor Seeks to Force Attorney to Make Report

Lincoln, Nov. 17.—(Special Telegram.)—Governor McKelvie is seeking legal advice as to how to force County Attorney J. L. Grimm of Scottsbluff to inform him what disposition has been made in the shooting and killing of Ignacio Mena, Mexican, last summer by the son of William John of Melbeta.

The governor received information of the shooting several months ago from Miguel Angel Rico, Mexican consul, at Kansas City, who stated that he could get no information from the county attorney.

"I have written the county attorney three times in an effort to get a report of the affair," the governor said. "I registered the last letter and still there is no reply."

Nebraska City Man Killed in Hunting Accident

Nebraska City, Neb., Nov. 17.—(Special.)—Louis Mitzner, 34, farmer, was instantly killed by the accidental discharge of his shotgun. The charge struck him in the right side just below the armpit. Mitzner, with a relative, had gone to a sandbar in the Missouri river and retired behind the blind, when Mitzner attempted to draw his gun over the shield, the hammer of the weapon striking a stick and being discharged. The victim was born in this community and made his home with a brother near Paul. He is survived by three brothers and five sisters.
