Playing before the largest crowd it has ever assembled at Creighton field, a crowd in which gray-haired 19-year-old mingled with young undergraduates, Creighton's football eleven yesterday handed the Michigan Aggies a 9 to 0 trimming.

This morning the followers of the Blue are thankful to Lewman Lane, Creighton's star quarterback.

Lawrence Lane They have proclaimed Lane the hero of all gridiron battles upon the field for it was this speedy and heady Creighton player who booted the three field goals, two in the second quarter and one in the third, that caused the story to find a resting place on the home banner.

The game brought out its stars, just like any football contest will do, but head and shoulders above all the rest stands Lewman Lane. Not because he booted the three field goals that beat the "Aggies," but because he played a whole of a game at quarterback, used his head at all times and was not a bit bashful when it came his turn to lug the oval.

Homecoming Day. Yeochout and "Tevlin," all backfield timber, also did their share in defeating the Aggies, while the entire line, especially Capt. Bendage, worked like they have never worked before, all to beat the invaders—and they succeeded.

It was homecoming day at Creighton and it will be a long day before the spectators who trickled into the Creighton athletic field Saturday will see another game like yesterday's battle between the Blue and Green. So well were the Aggies drilled in defensive tactics that not a single gridiron crossed the chalk mark at either end of the field.

Thrilling Contest.

Football playing, the like that has been witnessed on a Creighton field for the past two seasons, was the program. Two well-coached teams took the field at the start of the game and each provided the stands with thrill after thrill. Omaha may see more thrilling football battles before the season closes, it may even see a more powerful defense unleashed by some team or other, but it will not see a greater defensive effort than that which the Aggies displayed yesterday. One of the brightest lights of Creighton's backfield, Manley led his mitts around the ball as it was downed on the Aggie's 45-yard line. Tevlin then hit the Aggie's line with a ball. It moved back six feet and then Lane shimmied his way for eight yards. A series of line smashes, sprinkled with end runs, carried the leather to the Aggie's 23-yard line. After a short pass was completed, Lane dropped back to the 20-yard line. The Aggie's were required to break up a pass. Meanwhile, Ohio State, fighting grimly after three previous western conference defeats, took advantage of almost every opportunity and on several occasions threatened to convert an apparent defeat into a last-minute victory.

But the Luckies, conquerors of Yale and conference champion of last year, were not to be denied. Their offensive play, which worked with marvellous precision, overcame a special back, obtained by the back eyes, when Wilson, credited a punt and dashed across the goal in the first quarter, topped the second Hawkeye bid for supremacy, which came with Workman's field goal in the second
