P.)soldom has there has such an out burst of orstory and vindictive spacches against the United States as was witnessed in the chamber Friday evening when communications stating back to fast October were read. These letters, some of which were more personal notes between Foreign Secretary Pani and Mr. Bummerlin, sere interpreted as an encroachment upon the national sovereignty, and the lower house, manimously approving Prosident Obregon's attitude, yoled to inform all Latin American countries of "the Yankee attempts at anguarta Marga."

According to the communications as putilehed here, Mr. Summerlin intoker 19. wrote a personal note to Secretary Pant enclosing a copy of a droft of a proposed petroleum law America. and requesting a copy of the official full as soon as it was prepared.

Froposed Law Inadequate.

On October 31, Secretary Pani ne knowledged the note and on Novemher 15, according to the published mamoranda, he received another com munication from the American charge in which the latter said he had received instructions from the State department to inform the Mexican minater "that the proposed petroleum lass to entirely inadequate for the protection of rights legally acquired by North Americana."

On November 16, Secretary Pani replied that both he and President Obreport had sent no such project to 2033 624 88.






