

December 3 to 9 Designated as Education Week

Harding Calls Upon People to Work for Better Understanding Between School and Home.

Washington, Nov. 20.—President Harding, in a proclamation made public at the White House, set aside the week of December 3 to 9 as American Education week. He recommends to the appropriate national, state and local authorities that they give their cordial support and co-operation and also call upon parents to enlist themselves in behalf of closer understanding between the school and the home. The text of the proclamation follows: "The ideals of democratic government and democratic education were planted simultaneously in our country. The fathers rightly believed that only a people trained to a vision of public needs and duties could develop a government. The system of universal education established in the beginning, has developed with the country and become one of the characteristic features of our life. In it we have laid the foundation of that system of American culture which has enabled us to absorb and assimilate millions who have come to us from many countries, bringing the traditions of widely varying institutions. "In order that we may keep in mind the need constantly to improve our educational system, it is proposed that the week of December 3 to 9, inclusive, be set aside for special observance, as American education week. It is recommended to the governors of the states that they cooperate with the educational and civil authorities of their commonwealths to make the week a period of revival of interest in the broad work of national education."

Colla said yesterday her mother wanted to go to Marie's. "I and Don didn't go in because we are not wanted there," she said. A state law regarding support of parents by children may be invoked by welfare board officials.

Big Wall Street Operator Freed of Debt in Court

Allan A. Ryan, Who Filed Voluntary Petition Last Summer Is Discharged From Bankruptcy.

New York, Nov. 20.—Allan A. Ryan, who filed a voluntary petition of bankruptcy with liabilities of \$18,600,000 last summer, was discharged from bankruptcy today in federal court. Although Mr. Ryan himself refused to comment on his plans for the future, it was learned from his close friends that he has made careful plans to come back in the financial world that knew him for several years as one of the most daring and successful speculators in Wall street.

Mr. Ryan's liabilities amounted to \$13,000,000, of which \$14,000,000 was owed to banks on pledged securities, and the remaining \$4,000,000 was to unsecured creditors. A large quantity of the stock of the Stutz Motor company, which Mr. Ryan attempted to corner on the Stock Exchange, was pledged for a large loan to a local bank. This stock, which carried with it control of the Stutz company, was later sold to Charles M. Schwab of the Bethlehem Steel corporation. No accounting has ever been made of the amount the secured creditors received on their claims against the Ryan estate. The receiver said that the return to the unsecured creditors would be negligible.

Blaze in Poultry Concern Building Puzzles Firemen

Grand Island, Neb., Nov. 20.—Fire believed to have been of incendiary nature was nipped in the bud by the early discovery and quick response of the fire department to the Younkin Wholesale Poultry house. A blaze was discovered in the office. Oil-saturated paper and the absence of two check register books, discovered after the prompt extinguishing of the flames, officials said, indicated a criminal attempt, the motive for which is a mystery to Mr. Younkin, the owner, and to the department.

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President of Omaha Lumber Firm Dies

J. Stewart White, president of the H. L. Cady Lumber company, died yesterday at his residence, 1227 South Thirty-fifth avenue, following an illness of three weeks. Funeral services will be held Wednesday afternoon at 3 with burial at Forest Lawn cemetery. The Masonic order will be in charge of the services which will be private at the home and the burial also will be private. The family requests that flowers be not sent.

Mr. White was 68 yesterday, a native of New York state and a resident of Omaha 49 years. He is survived by Mrs. White and a daughter, Mrs. J. C. McClure. A brother, Chapman White, lives in New York. Mr. White was treasurer of the Omaha Automobile club and was active in the good roads movement. He was a former director of the Chamber of Commerce, member of the University club, and a Shriner.
