"Big Ten" Grid Title May Not Have an Owner

Chicago, Nov. 21.—With a triple tie in prospect, the 1922 western conference football title, won last year by Iowa, may be left without an owner. Iowa, Michigan and Chicago remain undefeated and should the three win next Saturday in the season's final games, the conference honors will be shared by the trio.

Mr. John L. Griffith, commissioner of athletics in the conference, announced tonight that there is no provision in the rules for a post season play-off and that the rule limiting the conference teams to seven games would prevent a deciding contest.

Iowa and Chicago each have five conference games on their schedules, while Michigan has but four. In the final games next Saturday, Michigan meets Minnesota, Chicago will face Wisconsin, while Northwestern will furnish Iowa's opposition.

Central High Ousts Ineligible Player From Football Eleven

After going into the birth records and learning that Arnold McDermott of the Central football team is 22 years old, one year past the age limit of the Nebraska high school athletic association, Principal J. C. Masters this morning wired the state board of control of the ineligibility of the player and asked the board to act accordingly.

In his telegram, Masters declared the player had misrepresented his age on enrollment.

Masters did not ask for clemency and declared that the "state championship, which we have not as yet won, is a small matter compared with the proper observance of the rules and good sportsmanship.

McDermott has been notified that he is ineligible for any further participation in athletics.

He maintains that he thought he was only 20 years old.

Masters was requested to look into the question of McDermott's age following rumors that Coach James Drummond of Tech, which Central plays Thanksgiving day, would ask that the player be kept out of the lineup.

He issued the following statement: "We feel that Central high school has been betrayed in the making, in that a student actually misrepresented his age upon the records of the school team that time he was entered. We have wired Tech, Omaha, to advise them of this and to ask them to act accordingly. We have also wired the state board of control of this student's age and have asked for only a very brief case of time in case we get a game in the state, but this is of little moment at this time. We wish the state board of control to take whatever action it would take under any possible circumstances. The matter of the state championship which we have not as yet won is a small matter compared with the proper observance of the rules, and good sportsmanship.

I know for the past eight years that we have done our utmost to follow the state rules, and we regard very greatly at this time that an ineligible man on the Central high squad has so misrepresented his age that he has been able to play for even a small time on our team.

About three years ago when a doubtful case was up, I ruled the student ineligible and immediately referred the case with the full facts to the state board of control. The state board, after reviewing the case fully, decided that the student might play. This is the attitude we have taken heretofore, and it is the attitude we shall continue to take in the future.

Landis Starts Investigation of Reports That Major League Ball Players Are Barnstorming

Chicago, Nov. 21.—Investigation of reports that two major league baseball players are violating the rule regarding barnstorming by playing winter baseball on the Pacific coast, was started today by Commissioner K. M. Landis upon the receipt of a letter from the players mentioned are Bill Finney, pitcher of the Boston Red Sox, and "Red" Oldham, a twister of the Detroit Tigers. They are alleged to have been members of a club which played in Los Angeles last Sunday.

In a letter to the players, Landis stated that the rule against barnstorming is one of the most important of the rules of the National League and that any player who violates it is liable to be suspended for a period of 30 days.

Landis also stated that the rule is designed to protect the integrity of the National League and to prevent the players from receiving undue financial gain from barnstorming.

Landis is expected to issue a statement regarding the investigation in the next few days.
