

Scottish Rite Fall Reunion Classes Tonight

Assembly One of Largest and Most Successful in History—Class Consists of 150.

The 1922 fall reunion of the four bodies of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Valley of Omaha, Orient of Nebraska, will be closed this evening with the Nebraska consistory banquet in the Scottish Rite cathedral, Douglas and Twentieth streets, at 6.

The 1922 fall reunion will go down in Nebraska Masonic history as one of the largest and most successful reunions in the history of the rite.

The class of 150 Masons, who are taking the degrees, will assemble at 8 this morning, on the first floor of the cathedral, and will receive the 31st degree of grand inspector in-inspector commander, John Emerson Simpson, 324, K. C. C. H., venerable master of Kadosh, will be in charge. Following the exemplification of this degree, the class and visiting Scottish Rite Masons from out in the state will be served luncheon at 12 noon.

Organize at 1.

The class, whose sponsor is Francis Merritt Pond, 334, will effect its organization at 1 in the afternoon.

The candidates will assemble on the first floor again at 2 in the afternoon, when they will receive the 32d degree of the sublime prince of the royal secret. This degree will be given in two sections and will occupy the majority of the afternoon.

On Wednesday, the class was taken through the 20th degree of the master of symbolic lodge, 21st degree of Noachite, 22d degree of the knight of the royal ax, 23d degree of the chief of the tabernacle in the morning.

Following noon luncheon, served by the Scottish Rite Woman's club, the class received the 24th degree of the prince of the tabernacle, 25th degree of the knight of the brazen serpent, 26th degree of the prince of mercy, 27th degree of the knight commander of the temple, 28th degree of the knight of the sun, and the 29th degree of the grand Scottish knight of St. Andrew.

30th Degree Conferred.

After dinner at 6, the 30th degree of knight of Kadosh was conferred.

Hearst Seeks Presidency, Is Chicago Rumor

Mayors of Two Leading Cities Hold Conferences—Both Aspire for Senate Seats.

Chicago, Nov. 22.—Mayor John F. Hylan of New York, who came to Chicago ostensibly for a "rest," after the trying work in the recent election, appears to have had a "rest" that is best described as hectic.

Political wisecracks hereabouts figure out that the real mission of his journey to Chicago was to confer with Mayor Thompson and lay the foundation for a political tripartite

has for its object landing William Randolph Hearst in the presidential chair in 1924, while Hylan and Thompson, secure seats in the United States senate.

Since Hylan's arrival here he has done no "resting," as the term is understood here. As soon as he arrived he announced that the country needs such a man as Hearst to represent the "plain people" and that unless Hearst or Hiram Johnson were nominated by one of the old parties, there would be a third party.

Politicians here say Hearst has been sadly disappointed in his political aspirations in the democratic party. They believe he intends to concentrate all his efforts in one last attempt at the next presidential election and in case of failure will remain out of politics.

Hylan is said to have ambitions to be senator from New York and it is a matter of common belief that Mayor Thompson cherishes the same ambition to represent Illinois, and possibly

later to win the presidency. It has been common political knowledge for months, say those who follow the political game, that Hearst is planning to foster an independent third party of labor, farmers and the semi-radical, discontented elements. With these elements lined up and with the additional powerful support of the tremendous political "machines" of New York and Chicago, it is said Hearst considers he has a chance of being elected president.

Temperature in November Thus Far 125 Above Normal

Absence of snow so far this year may establish a November record, according to the weather bureau. There were two snowfalls earlier than this last year, one on November 8 and again on November 18. In 1919 there was an 11-inch precipitation, and in 1916 four inches in October.

Temperature this November is 125 degrees above the normal thus far. Last November it was below normal.
