Drama League to Present Greek Drama Dec. 5

On December 5 Penelope Wheeler comes to Omaha under the auspices of the Drama League. She will give a dramatic recital of a great Greek play, probably one of Euripides (Medea), using the most poetic of the English translations, that of Gilbert Murray.

The Greek dramas are very like those of Shakespeare in the appeal they make to all classes of people. Their plays were given out of doors in very extensive amphitheatres. Many of the colleges have reproduced these Greek operatic theaters.

The Medea was produced in 431 B. C. In the prologue the audience is apprised of the events that have gone before. There was the quest of the Golden Fleece; the return to Iolchus; the murder of Pelias; the resulting flight of Medea, the foreign wife, and Jason to Corinth; later the infatuation of Jason for the Princess Creusa and his consequent desertion of Medea.

Medea was madly jealous and sent her children with a poisoned robe, prepared by her own sorcery, to the princess, who dies. Then as a last revenge after a mighty struggle with herself she nerves herself to slay her children. Of course this act of infanticide would bring the wrath of the Fates, but King Aegeus promises to give her a haven in his land. The gods appear (ex machina) to carry her away with the bodies of the two children. The chorus, composed of a group of women in sympathy with Medea, but prophesying the tragic outcome of events. The scene is laid at Medea's house at Corinth.
