Facts That Save Clothes and Money

Real harm can be done to clothes through inadequate attention after they are soiled waiting to go to the wash tub. When they are in the laundry bag state they are not usually given much attention. In the first place clothes should never be allowed to remain closely confined in warm weather. Just because they show no actual mold or mildew does not mean that the warmth and moisture do not injure their fine texture. Moreover, clothes that are allowed to lie moist and warm are more difficult to wash clean than clothes that are washed soon after discarding or are allowed to dry and remain in an open place before washing.

In warm weather soiled clothes bags and hampers should be emptied every day. There is where the house dweller has the advantage of the flat or apartment dweller. For where there is a cellar there is a laundry where clothes can be spread out before washing to prevent their lying in a damp mass. Bath towels especially should be spread on clothes bars and never left moist and warm for a day or so before washing. If clothes are going to be washed within a day they can be thrown into a tub of cold or warm water to soak. This is sometimes easier than drying, but, especially in
