to Probe Klan Activities

"I have been informed," said Judge Mancuso to the jurors, "that several meetings were held in this city where full regalia was used, consisting of a-gown and mask. It is your duty to make an investigation of this matter with a view of ascertaining whether any of the acts committed by the klan came within the purview of the statutes of this state.

Judge Mancuso said the invasion of the klan was directed apparently "not only against the negro, Jew and the representative body of the pro-Catholic, but against any and all pervisional free state government. Under sons who don't accept the principles of the klan."




