



for \$5.000,000 Damages Washington, Dec. 6.-The United States gave the republic of Colombia a check for \$5,000,000, its first payment under the \$25,000,000 treaty ratlfied in 1921 to cover certain damages incurred in the construction of the Panama canal. The payment was due September 30, but for some unexplained reason Colombia was not ready to receive it until today. Under the treaty the remaining payments 16 will be made yearly in \$5,000,000 sums.
