

### Russia to Emerge by Gradual Stages, Indiana Man Says

Washington, Dec 10 .- (By A. P.)-By a gradual change through the orderly processes of evolution and not by counter revolution, will Russia emerge from its present condition, declared former Governor James P. Goodrich of Indiana, speaking here before the conference on public opinion and world peace. An official government investigation of conditions in that country was made by Mr. Goodrich last year.
