

Dr. Buckner's Son Answers Bishop Stuntz in Brief

Declares His Father Was Ejected Because of Views and Not for Being "Childish."

Aurora, Neb., Dec. 11.—(Special)—In a brief dealing with the history of the unfracking of Dr. J. D. M. Buckner, former Methodist pastor of Aurora, by the recent Methodist conference, his son, Emory R. Buckner of New York, endeavors to prove that Dr. Buckner was deprived of his right to preach solely because of his views as a progressive Christian and not because he had become too old to do effective work in the ministry and had become childish in his interpretations of the Bible.

This brief, just printed and sent to a number of Methodists, is an answer to a letter recently published by Bishop Homer C. Stuntz in which the bishop said that it was Dr. Buckner's negative preaching, his frequent repetition of the same platitudes and half truths, the continual riding of this "progressive" hobby, his persistence in setting up a straw man in the pulpit and in the secular papers and proceeding to demolish him, which had made him unacceptable to the conference.

In this letter Bishop Stuntz, speaking of Dr. Buckner, says: "His persistent attempt to make it appear that he was retired because he was a progressive in his thought about the scriptures is childish." In concluding his brief Emory Buckner says:

"The evidence is overwhelming that Bishop Stuntz and his cabinet adopted a resolution recommending that the conference refer J. D. M. Buckner to the committee on conference relations for retirement, solely because of his views and because of his publication of the article 'A Good God' and because of the publication of a summary of his farewell sermon.

"The evidence is overwhelming that the committee on conference relations discussed nothing but theology and recommended retirement solely because of my father's views and alleged indiscreet publication."

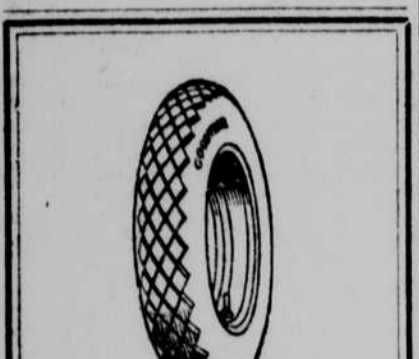
He says that his attempt to get away from the issue by calling Dr. Buckner childish has become national and that the Methodists of the country are entitled to the truth. He insists that his father was thrown out of his pulpit because of his teaching that the Bible is not entirely inspired and that the Methodists in the conference were unable or did not dare discuss those teachings, and therefore invoked a technical law of the church to retire Dr. Buckner.

Western States Ask Cut in Freight Rates

(Continued From Page One.) made by W. J. Conway, commerce counsel for the Kansas commission, concluded the first day's hearing. From selected tables of rates and calculations made from them concerning which railroad counsel drew him, into cross-examination, Mr. Conway argued that railroads were now earning on wheat shipments amounts ranging from 89 to 101 per cent greater than they earned in 1913.

On corn and other coarse grains, he estimated, their returns were from 25 to 70 per cent greater than in 1913. On hay in 1913, he said, railroads received amounts ranging from 11 to 45 cents per car mile of the product moved, while today the rates earned them from 20 to 84 cents. On oats, in 1913, car mile earnings were from 18 to 81 cents, while today he estimated they ranged from 35 cents to \$2.32. If a given unit quantity of railroad transportation could be imagined, he concluded, a farmer in 1913 could buy 16 units with a bushel of wheat, while today he could buy but 11.8 units for the same wheat.

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RADIO SOLVING AERIAL LEAD PROBLEM

Possibly some radio bugs have been confronted with the problem of making some kind of an entrance through the walls of their houses for their aerial leads without disfiguring the premises, especially so in rented houses. This problem especially arises as the cold weather sets in and the open window must be discontinued.

A plan which will work admirably is to take two sheets of tin foil, the size can be adjusted to the capacity desired, cover the outside of a portion of your window with glue, attach the sheet of foil and apply a coat of shell lac, do the same on the inside of the window, attach your aerial lead to the outside foil and the receiving lead to the inside foil, grounds can usually be made on water systems and you have a set up without making an entrance through your walls.

A suitable lightning arrester may, if desired, be placed on the wall near the window and the aerial run to this, the other side to the tin foil.—B. M. P., Cedar Rapids, Ia.

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Russian Brigand Is Imprisoned for Propaganda

Career Reads Like Motion Picture Scenario; Started Out as an Anarchist Lieutenant.

Warsaw, Dec. 11.—Makhno, a semi-brigand leader, who once gave the soviet government of Russia great trouble, has been imprisoned on charges of aiding bolshevist propagandists in eastern Galicia.

Makhno's career is one that might go for a motion-picture scenario. Originally an anarchist, he was for a time the trusted lieutenant of Grigorieff, formerly a social revolutionist and then a Green army leader, who sometimes served and sometimes revolted against the Moscow government. Grigorieff is said to have had a weakness for murdering Jews, and his cruelties at Odessa are notorious; but he met death, it is stated, at the hands of Makhno.

On getting command of the Green army, Makhno sometimes fought the Red armies and even massacred communists. He also opposed Denikin and Wrangel. He is said to have a prejudice against people who wear spectacles, and generally he put suspected people to death whenever he captured them.

Makhno's strength was in his peasant supporters. When they failed to follow him he fled to Poland for refuge.

Duke of Abercorn Named Governor of North Ireland

London, Dec. 10.—(By A. P.)—The Duke of Abercorn has been appointed governor of northern Ireland by King George.

The appointment of the Duke of Abercorn as governor general of northern Ireland was expected, as he was the choice for that position several weeks ago.

The Duke of Abercorn was elected to the senate of the Ulster parliament in 1921. He served in the imperial parliament for the city of London, 1900-13, and was appointed lord lieutenant of Tyrone in 1917.

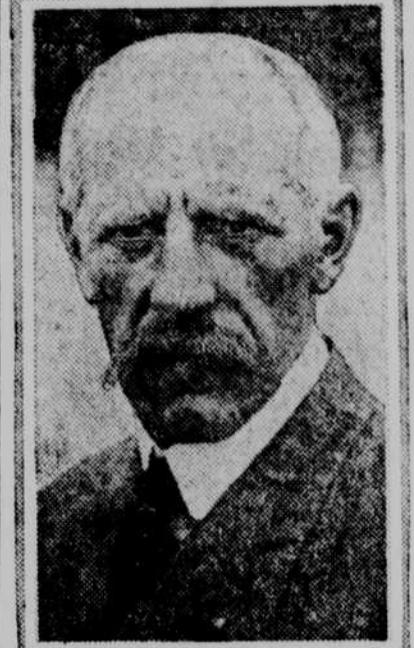

Nobel Peace Prize Won by Dr. Fridtjof Nansen

Christiania, Norway, Dec. 11.—(By A. P.)—The Nobel peace prize yesterday was presented to Dr. Fridtjof Nansen. The award was made for Dr. Nansen's work in relieving the starving population of Russia and Asia Minor on behalf of the league of nations and for his endeavors to promote a brotherhood of nations.

Medals of distinction have been awarded by the National Geographical society to Amundsen, Bartlett, Gilbert, Peary, Shackleton and Stefansson.

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Pastor Saves Church from Fire by 4-Hour Fight With Old Hat

Astoria, Ore., Dec. 11.—Members of the First Baptist church congregation here told today for the first time how their edifice had been saved from destruction in Friday's great fire by the pastor, Rev. A. E. Gottberg, whose only fire fighting weapon was a battered felt hat.

Rev. Mr. Gottberg rushed to his church, located at some distance from the main fire as soon as he knew the fire was in progress throughout the city. Mounting to the roof through a trap door he found that sparks had just ignited the shingles in several places.

He pulled off his hat, beat out the first incipient blaze, scrambled along to the next one and beat that out and kept up this process as fast as new fires broke out.

After four hours of single-handed labor he found the danger over and descended, having put out fires in more than a dozen places from the church roof.

More Earthquakes in Chile. Santiago, Chile, Dec. 11.—(By A. P.)—Strong earth shocks were felt at Hlapeal and Ovalle early today, according to advices received here.

State railway officials said that communication north of the latter town had been interrupted and that Coquimbo did not answer calls.

The shocks were felt very strongly at Los Andes but apparently extended no further south than Valparaiso, where a tremor was noticed.

The center of the disturbance is believed to have been in the Valdivia district where the recent disturbances occurred.

Man Killed; Officer Hurt in Gun Fight

Crestone, O., Dec. 11.—One man was killed, two policemen were wounded, one probably fatally, and a companion of the dead man is in a hospital, the result of a shooting affray here last night.

Night Patrolman Andrew J. Hess, 55, was shot through the abdomen probably will die, physicians declare.

The officers suspected the men of being bootleggers. When they approached them the men opened fire, the officers said. The patrolmen returned the fire, one of the men dropping dead from wounds.

Ku Klux Klan Denounced by New York Ministers

New York, Dec. 11.—The "Invisible Empire" was the object of vitriolic anti-Ku Klux Klan sermons delivered in several churches and in an announcement by Assistant District Attorney Ferdinand Pecora that he will resume his probe in to Klan activities here.

While pastors denounced the Klan from their pulpits, Pecora declared that he was not fully satisfied with his recent interview with the Rev. Oscar Haywood, leading Klux organizer in New York, and will call the minister for a more complete examination of his connection with the Klan.

Urichville, O., Dec. 11.—Cries of their 2-year-old daughter led to the discovery yesterday of the bodies of Paul Kirchoff, 25, and his wife, 23. Death was caused by accidental asphyxiation, according to authorities.
