## Two Missouri Valley Teams on Creighton Cage Schedule

Two, and probably three, Missouri valley teams will oppose Creighton on the hardwood floor, according to the 1923 schedule, as announced this morning by A. A. Schabinger, athletic director.

Kansas, which tied Missouri for the valley cage championship last season, will open the Hilltops' cage season here January 7.

Nebraska, which promises to have a team capable of fighting for the valley championship next year, will close the locals' season here on March 2.

The Kansas Aggies may be the third Missouri valley opponent. Schabinger has tentatively scheduled a two-game series with the Farmers for January 26 and 27. In the event the Kansas do not definitely accept the dates, South Dakota university will be substituted.

A tentative two-game has also been matched with Michigan Aggies at Lansing.

A total of 19 games are on the Blue and White schedule.

Benjamin claims the Pacific coast lightweight title. The winner of tonight's fray will be matched with Ray Long, of Oklahoma City, Okl., it was announced.

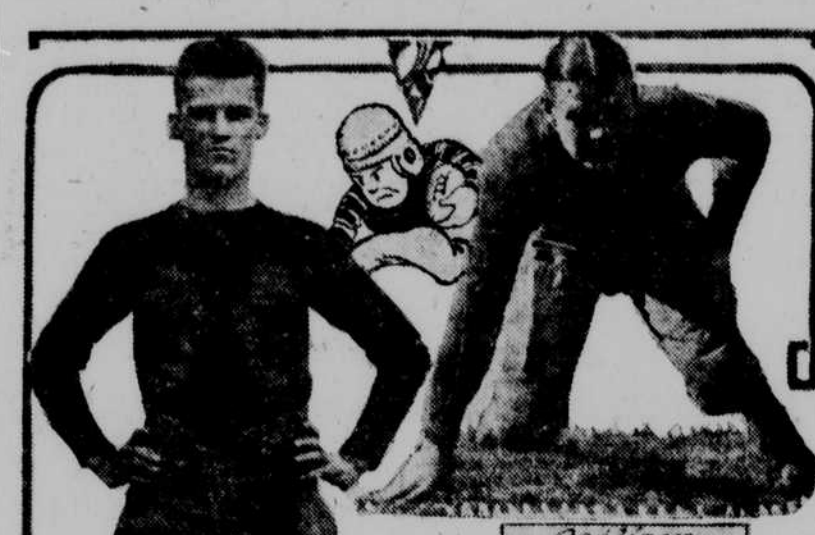
## Uni. of Kentucky in Market for Grid Team Mascot

Q What is blocking?

Q Is there such a thing as a foul out of play?

A. Blocking is impeding the progress of an opponent who has not the ball. It is a foul.

Q How long can I hold the ball out of my hands after I have taken it?

A. Fifteen seconds. If you hold it longer it goes to your opponent.

Q Is there such a penalty as a double foul?

A. A double foul is made by both teams having fouls called against them simultaneously.

Q How to Play Basketball.

Passing and catching. After selecting the method of catching you are to use, the passer should approach over the court and pass the ball around.

The first lesson in passing and catching should be taught standing still. When you are sure that all have grasped the idea correctly, allow the men to move around on the floor, passing and catching while on the move. Every time a poor pass or fumble is made, the play should be stopped and the attention of the offender called to it. Most fumbles are caused by poor passes. Remember it makes the catch easy if the pass is a good one. The ball going to a player in motion should always be shoveled, waist, and caught above of him so that the ball and the player receiving will reach the same spot at the same instant.

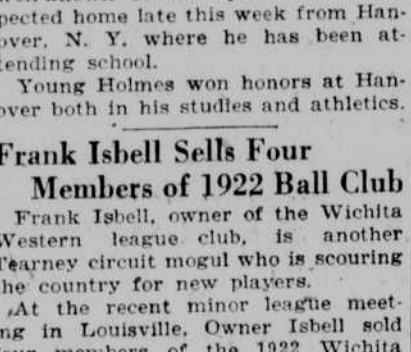

The ball going to a player in motion should always be shoveled, waist, and caught above of him so that the ball and the player receiving will reach the same spot at the same instant.

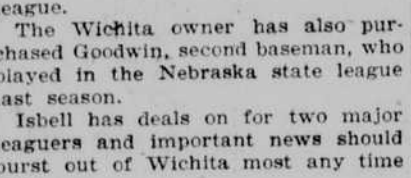

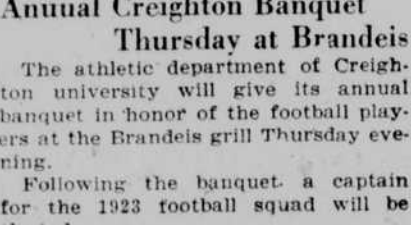

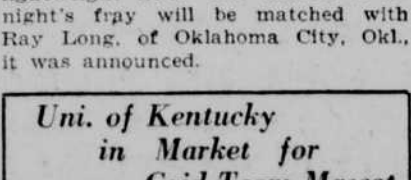
