

Jeweler Slugged, Jews' Army Parallel of **Irish Force**

Half Million Trained Men **First Protective Force** Since Biblical Days.

London, Dec. 20 .- For the first time since the days recorded in the Bible the Jews have a large army, capable of protecting the lives and interests of their nationals in Russia. The army began in secret a year ago and in many respects parallels Michael Collins' army before free state days. The Jewish defense army has grown until it approximates 500,000 strong. It is well equipped with rifles and machine guns. Branches of it exist in every city of the Ukrainian republic, having Jewish population.

These astonishing facts were established by correspondents on a trip from Odessa to Moscow. A large number exists in Ukraine. 
Orders for Omaha Goods
