Our friend took us over to the house where Rousseau lived. We visited his studio and went into the little chapel which was once his stable, but which was given by him to the people of Barbazon on condition that it was never to be sold or used for anything but a chapel. In the studio was a hus" by Millet. We were told that this is the only steel engraving of "The Angelus" in existence, and that the plate was destroyed soon after this was made. On the frame was written "Offert par Mme. Millet." presented by Mme. Millet. From here we went up the historic street, the one main street of the vil-lage, past the home of Naroiers Div

lage, past the home of Narcisse Diaz, "Inhabited this house 1807-1876;" past the home of "Antoine Louis Baryre, sculptor, 1796-1875," where we were told he made the lions that are brary in Washington; past the home of Robert Louis Stevenson of Daubigny and Jacques, and of several other world famous artists. Back a little from the street and at one side of a beautiful lawn, was a small building called "The Souvenir." During the palmy days of Barbazon, when the great artists were there, one, a wealthy gentleman, bought up the paint-ings of these men and hid them away

Ings of these men and hid them away in this place. Millet, Corot, Daubigny and other artists were for years so poor they were compelled to sell their paintings at a mere trifle in order to live. This man pretended to take their paintings to Paris.
Instead he hid them away in this building and out of his own pocket paid them whatever he saw fit, some times a pittance in money, sometimes a leg of mutton or a slice of ham, always probably more than their paintings would have brought had they been sold in Paris. 

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


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
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
