It was reiterated today that although the attitude of the American government would be one of watchful waiting, any definite indication that the conference was breaking up might provoke some expression from Washington. It was said in American circles just before the conference opened that the indications were that some compromise would be reached preserving the allied accord on reparations. Such a compromise it was thought, might take the line of strictly economic guarantees in return for a moratorium for Germany and probably include an agreement on a reduction of the total indemnity.

#### Capt. Lawrence O'Brien Dies.
