"If Mr. Thomas can show a single solitary instance of my failure to enforce the law, I'll resign," said U. S. Rohrer, federal prohibition enforcement officer of Nebraska, yesterday, answering a statement by Elmer Thomas before the W. C. T. U., that "if Rohrer is unwilling or inefficient to the extent that he cannot cope with numerous alleged violations of the law, he should resign."

"If Mr. Thomas has legal evidence to support his statements as to violations of the national prohibition act. let him present it to this office and complaints will be filed at once and prosecutions carried on," said Rohrer. "If he has such evidence and fails to present it to some authority with power to act, he is certainly negligent in his duty as a citizen and a chairman of the executive committee of
