Recall of Troops End of America's Europe Adventure

United States Looks on France as "Loved but Erring Comrade" in Advance on Ruhr.

Washington, Jan. 10.—(Special.)—Recall of the American troops from the Rhine is the closing chapter of the American adventure in Europe, so far as the continuation of the work of the expeditionary force is concerned.

By ordering the Americans out of Germany, the United States has retroactively served notice on its former ally, France, that she does not approve the course being taken by that government in proposing to occupy the Ruhr.

Coblentz, Jan. 11.—(By A. P.)—The French troops will occupy Essen at 2 this (Thursday) morning.

Paris, Jan. 10.—(By A. P.)—France will go into the Ruhr Thursday morning; tanks, troops, airplanes and engineers are ready. Essen will bow to the French in the early morning hours and Premier Poincare, when he appears in parliament Thursday will tell not what he plans to do, but what he has done.

France, with Belgium at its side and supported by Italy, will begin the long talked of "separate action." The decision of President Harding to withdraw immediately the American troops from the Rhineland came as a blow to the pride of France and to the French sense of right, although there is no word of official criticism—only regret.

The French people, however, are standing behind their government at what is frequently described as the most critical moment since the end of the war. Germany was notified today in identical notes from France and Belgium that, starting Thursday, control of the Ruhr coal distribution would be under a commission which will go in with a small army as a guard. Italian hesitation has been giving some concern, but Italian engineers will go with the French and Belgians, which fact M. Poincare's note to Germany mentioned.
