grade, the resolution declared that the education of the elementary schools should equip the child for a useful career. It was received that curriculums of high schools should be revised to eliminate the superficial features. Present competitive systems of sports in the school was held to be comparable to the middle ages, this modern sporting spirit dominating all activities in the schools. Simple calisthenics were approved and championship sports were condemned in public schools.

Ask Salary Reductions.

Another resolution held that the farmer being the cheapest worker in the world and the most willing to work, now asks for a reduction of salaries of other workers to help the farmer bear burdens for which he is not responsible.

Amendment of the Nebraska Storage Law.

Amendment of the Nebraska storage law was asked, that the country grain elevators may use the law. The seating of United States senators and congressmen of January 1, following their election, was favored. Convention also favored removal of party circles on ballots and went on record for the open primary. Repeal of the code law was favored. A demand was made for taxation of tangible and intangible property on the same basis. Opposition was expressed to issuing tax-free securities and also to the county unit school system. It was

held that the taxation and rate-making values of service corporations should be the same. Increase of Federal Land bank loans from \$10,000 to \$25,000 was favored.

Credentials Committee Reported 587 delegates accredited and 122 visiting delegates. The total membership of the Farmers' Union in Nebraska was reported as 23,888.

Sectional Meetings Today.

Sectional meetings will be held this morning in Hotel Castle. Co-operative creameries was the special subject discussed during yesterday morning's session. Chris Henderson of Comstock recommended that the state be divided into districts, with managers, and a commission house established in an eastern city. He asserted that in Minnesota the centralized creameries cannot buy butter fat in districts, where co-operative creameries have been established. "If the Farmers' union will only patronize its own business, there will be no question as to the success of the creamery department," said Mr. Henderson.

Was No Competition.

"Until we had co-operative creameries in Nebraska there was no competition. Preach the gospel of co-operation and victory will follow," said W. P. Dale of University Place.

J. C. Norgaard, manager of the co-operative creamery at Superior, which was established five years ago, reported that his establishment handled a total business of \$400,000 last year and returned to its members 50 per cent profit on a capital of \$46,000. This creamery had an output of 1,250,000 pounds of butter.

"We must keep in mind," said Mr. Norgaard, "that there are more real dairymen in Minnesota or Wisconsin than there are in Nebraska. In our state the farmers think more of raising wheat or steers and you know that steers do not give milk. Let me give you an illustration by stating that at Superior we receive cream from a radius of 300 miles, while at Barron, Wis., enough cream is obtained from a radius of 13 miles to maintain the creamery there. We need legislation in Nebraska to require the sale of cream on a quality basis."

Shows Big Increase.

Mark Nelson, reporting for the co-operative creamery at Fremont, stated that last year the output was 1,250,000 pounds of butter, as against 700,000 pounds during the first year of operation seven years ago. William Koyen, also speaking for the Fremont creamery, asserted that this institution has not been measuring up to expectations but the management is hoping that it will pull out and make good. He added that the old-line creameries have been offering silverware premiums to farmers from whom they buy cream, and the co-operative creamery has been meeting that competition, too.

Speakers urged members of the Farmers' union to avoid being lured by slightly higher prices offered by old-line creamery companies. By contributing toward the success of the co-operative creameries, the members likewise share in the profits, the speakers explained.
