J. W. Steinhart of Nebraska City was elected president of the Nebraska Manufacturers association at the association convention in Hotel Fontenelle yesterday.

The association commended "the courage of President Harding in vetoing the soldiers' bonus and the pension bills, for the excellent reasons set forth in his messages, since we be lieve that this is not the time for increased burdens of taxation."

He predicted that a mass meeting in the Y. M. C. A. western Canadian provinces will in the near future force the Canadian parliament to take favorable action on the proposed water route.

It was pointed out in the discussion which followed Mr. Smith's talk, that. the waterway, when completed, will not only save time and transportation charges for Nebraska interests, but will be a remedy for car shortages which have in the past embarrassed grain_shippers of the state Favor Irrigation Plan.


C. W. McConaughy of Holdrege, speaking on the proposed irrigation and power project which is being fostered by the Central Nebraska Supplemetal Water association, explained that the plan calls for the building of two dams in the Plum Creek val ley; one four miles north of Elwood, and the other 12 miles down the valley. When completed, the project will irrigate 2,000,000 acres of semi-arid and arid land, Mr. McConaughy said. It also would generate power to furnish light, power and heat for 12 counties, according to Mr. McConed the land would be equivalent to 39 inches of rainfall, and would assure the fertility of the soil.


The association endorsed the project. J. W. Steinhart of Nebraska City was made chairman of a committee to present the plan to the state legislature.


A charge of mayhem probably will be filed against her, according to Deputy County Attorney Irvin Stal-Mrs. Shannon is alleged to have en-
