

Nebraska City Man Heads State Manufacturers

President Commended for Stand on Taxation Issues

J. W. Steinhart of Nebraska City was elected president of the Nebraska Manufacturers association at the association convention in Hotel Fontenelle yesterday.

The association commended "the courage of President Harding in the pending bills, for the excellent reasons set forth in his messages, since we believe that this is not the time for increased burdens of taxation."

Other resolutions expressed the association's confidence in the industrial outlook; commend the good work of the Nebraska state board of vocational education; hold for the need of an adequate merchant marine; complain that the present immigration laws are wholly inadequate to meet today's conditions and that the restrictive measures are wrong in principle and injurious to America's best interests; protest against the enactment of the Hull bill.

Progress that is being made toward a realization of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence tidewater project, was outlined in a short talk by Victor B. Smith, managing editor of The Omaha Bee.

Although New York interests have been rather successful in fighting the waterway project, a tendency in Washington to lend a more attentive ear to demands of the west, gives encouragement to those supporting it, Mr. Smith said.

It was pointed out in the discussion which followed Mr. Smith's talk, that the waterway, when completed, will not only save time and transportation charges for Nebraska interests, but will be a remedy for car shortages which have in the past embarrassed grain shippers of the state.

C. W. McCaughy of Holdrege, speaking on the proposed irrigation and power project which is being fostered by the Central Nebraska Supplemental Water association, explained that the plan calls for the building of two dams in the Plum Creek valley; one four miles north of Elwood, and the other 12 miles down the valley. When completed, the project will irrigate 2,000,000 acres of semi-arid and arid land, Mr. McCaughy said.

District Judge Sears Writes Another Poem

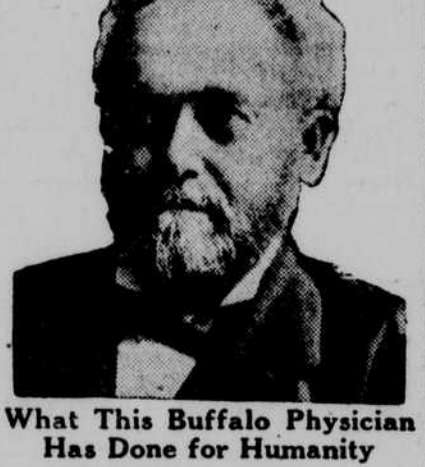
District Judge Sears, who was elected to congress at the recent election and who is the poet of the courts building, continues to write poetry.
