

State Senators Spend Busy Day Introducing Bills

Lincoln, Jan. 12.—(Special)—Nearly half a hundred bills were thrown into the senate hopper during the first week of the session.

A brief session this morning was the most productive of the entire week in the matter of proposed legislation, 15 bills being introduced.

Cooper of Douglas introduced the second bill providing for a salary boost which has been sponsored in both branches of the legislature.

Another bill by Cooper provides that notices for liens for internal revenue taxes due to the government must be filed with the register of deeds or county clerk along with a proper notice of release when the taxes are paid.

Osborne has drawn up a bill providing for the nonpartisan election of members of the legislature.

SENATE FILES.

S. P. 25, Hastings—Uniform bill of lading law.

S. P. 26, Hastings—Vacancies occurring in office of county judges, when vacancies do not exceed two years, shall be filled by appointment, over two years by special election.

S. P. 27, Hastings—Appeals from justice of the peace or county courts must be filed upon the same pleading filed in the court below without making up new issues in the district court.

S. P. 28, Price—Provides that tax money for paying school bonds in excess of interest thereon shall be placed in certificates of deposit in proper depositories instead of being invested in county, state or government bonds.

S. P. 29, Sturdevant—For the sale of state school lands after July 1, 1923, upon the application of a lease such lands to be sold to the highest bidder in tracts of not over 250 acres of farm and hay land, and not over 400 acres grazing land.

S. P. 30, Tomack and Gumbel—Provides that section of the law exempting executors and administrators from filing inventories of real estate and chattels.

S. P. 31, Hastings—Requires five-year period of incontestability, allows court five years to make property settlement in such cases.

S. P. 32, Richard—Limits appointment of a deputy county register, recorder, treasurer, sheriff, clerk, or surveyor to counties having 25,000 population or more.

S. P. 33, Richard—Provides that school districts to pupils residing within two miles of the school, except by majority vote of electors at an annual meeting.

S. P. 34, Richard—Notifies county treasurers to notify by mail every taxpayer of the amount of his real estate taxes, subdivided according to levies for smaller subdivisions.

S. P. 35, Richard—Communion bill to S. P. 42.

S. P. 36, Abolishes deputy county treasurers in counties of less than 6,000 population.

S. P. 37, Osborn—For nomination and election of members of the legislature on the non-partisan ballot.

S. P. 38, Cooper—Requires establishment of towns of over 25,000 of "salvage corps" as a branch of the fire department to save and preserve property and life during and after a fire.

S. P. 39, Cooper—Notifies of liens for internal revenue taxes due the United States must be filed with register of deeds or county clerk, also proper notice of release when taxes paid, such offenders to receive 10 cents fee for each filing.

S. P. 40, Cooper—Increases the salary of commissioner of State in Douglas county who acts as deputy county highway commissioner from \$2,500 to \$3,000 per year.

Thieves Make Escape While Contest Rages Over Sheriff's Office

Falls City, Neb., Jan. 12.—(Special)—Two men suspected of having stolen an automobile escaped arrest because the iron hand of the law was held in abeyance while the sheriff and sheriff-elect were settling the contested office in court.

The two men were observed near Rulo by Homer D. Kirk, mayor of that place, and he notified the sheriff's office. At that very hour, however, the question of who was sheriff was resting in the hands of County Judge Falloon, so the deputy, who received the call, delayed action until the result of the contest was determined.

At Union of Humboldt finally won out by three votes, but the thieves, not caring to wait for the result, skipped away in the meantime, leaving the car behind.

Boxing Head Is Refused Permit to Attend Meet

Bryan Denies Carroll Is State Sheriff—Budget Reduction Is Demanded by Governor.

Lincoln, Jan. 12.—(Special)—Governor Bryan today announced that he had refused to approve a trip to New York city by State Boxing Commissioner L. R. (Lum) Doyle to attend the meeting of the national association of state boxing commissioners.

The governor said he did not consider it necessary for the proper regulation of sport in Nebraska that the boxing commissioner attend the national meeting and that he considered it a junketing trip.

The governor complained that his announcement of the appointment of Tom Carroll as law enforcing officer had been misconstrued as a continuation of the state sheriff's department.

Mr. Bryan claimed the state sheriff's office had been created without authority of law and that Mr. Carroll would work directly under him as his law-enforcing officer.

The governor is still busy engaged in preparing his budget message for the legislature. The governor is calling in various department heads and insisting they reduce their estimates.

In a large number of instances, he claimed, the departments were complying with the request.

Luxury Tax Is Urged to Support Public Schools

Mrs. E. C. Felton of York Is Elected President of State School Executives' Association.

Lincoln, Jan. 12.—(Special)—Election of a luxury tax, the proceeds of which shall go for the support of the schools, is the answer which the Nebraska State Boards and School Executives association makes to the demand for lower school expenditures in the state.

Although no definite provisions for a luxury tax were outlined in the resolutions which were adopted and which will be sent to the legislature, speakers during the course of the discussion mentioned cigars and cosmetics.

These officers were elected at the closing session of the association: President, Mrs. E. C. Felton, York; Secretary, C. Ray Gates, Grand Island; Treasurer, H. O. Schaaf, David City; executive committee, Supt. H. E. Simmons, Norfolk; G. W. Bishop, University Place, and H. S. King, York.

Pierce Man Is Awarded Compensation by State

Lincoln, Jan. 12.—(Special)—Compensation Commissioner Frank Kennedy has awarded Henry C. Poellott of Pierce temporary compensation of \$15 a week, with hospital expenses, and with a 50 per cent penalty for delinquent payments.

Secretary of Agriculture Files Report With Governor

Lincoln, Jan. 12.—(Special)—Secretary Mayer of the department of agriculture has filed a report with Governor Bryan on activities of the department.

His report shows cash on hand January 1 totalled \$362,320.70, as against \$338,000 on January 12. The report shows total receipts for the fiscal year ending July 1, 1922, of \$215,273.37, while operating expenses aggregated \$158,693.02.

The biggest source of revenue was the food, drugs and oil inspection bureau, where fees and licenses aggregated \$150,000, while cost of operation was \$42,000.

Nebraskans Are Invited to Marketing Conference

Lincoln, Jan. 12.—(Special)—Acting Secretary Mayer of the department of agriculture received an invitation to attend a conference to be held in Sioux City, January 24, attended by representatives of various farm organizations in midwestern states to devise better marketing plans for agricultural products.
