Havana, Jan. 13 .- According to Fausto Rodriguez, manager of the local office of the Aero Marine Airways, owners of the Columbus, the seaplane made a forced landing. The passengers and crew were transferred to the ferry boat Flagler and the plane was abandoned.

The Columbus left Key West at 12:30, Mr. Rodriguez sald, and was forced down by engine trouble about 20 miles north of Havana, the Henry M. Flagler going to the plane's astance about 20 minutes later.

To Resume Coal Delivery

Berlin, Jan. 13 .- (By A. P.)-At Steele, two miles outside of Essen, the French flag hoisted by the occupying troops was torn down and destroyed, says a dispatch to Vorwaerts today. The burgomaster had to apologize to the French commander and publish an appeal warning the population against excesses.

To Resume Deliveries. Essen, Jan. 13 .- (By A. P.)-At this
