When is a goal or free throw made?

A. If the ball enters the basket from above and remains in or passes through, it counts as a goal for the team shooting for that basket, regardless of which player throws it.

Q. When time is called out, does play go back to center?

A. No. The ball shall be tossed up between the two players on opposing

A. No. The ball shall be tossed up between the two players on opposing teams nearest to it, at that spot where it was when play ceased; except that it play ceases when the ball is out of bounds; it shall be put in play as far out of bounds; or except also that if a goal is called, play shall be resumed with the free throw for goal.

Q. When is a ball put in play at center?

A. At the beginning of each half, or quarter and of each extra period; after a goal has been made; after an illiegal free throw has been made; after the balk has lodged in the supports of the baskets; after the last free throw of a double foul.

How to Play Basket Ball.

Offense. Center play No. 3. This is a simple effective play, when a fast dribbling guard is used. We will take for granted your fast dribbling defensive man plays right guard. The center taps the ball off laterally to the right. The forward draws his guard up and out towards the side line. The left forward has come up on his own side of the court, drawing his guard with him. The right guard comes in, takes the ball while in the sir, breaks into a dribble and goes all the way through to the basket. Sounds too simple to be good. Try it out if you have a fast dribbling guard. A slow man could never get to the basket in time. 
