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Jesus Did Not Hold Power of God, Says Episcopal Pastor

New York, Jan. 15.—Unorthodox views regarding miracles, consecration of churches and other matters as expressed in a sermon by the Rev. Percy Stiebecky Grant, attracted considerable attention today.

Preaching yesterday in the Church of the Ascension (Protestant Episcopal) on Fifth avenue, of which he is rector.

"Very few clergymen today who have been educated in the large universities accept the idea that Jesus had the power of God. He doubtless did miracles as they were regarded in his day, but as M. Coue points out, many of these acts were acts of auto-suggestion and would fall under well known categories clearly and well classified by psychologists today.

Science understands them. They are not miracles. Consecration of churches is an idea inherited from the ages of witchcraft and magic. Dr. Grant declared.
