

Attract Young to State Fair, Danielson Plan

Secretary in Annual Report Shows Last Exposition Profitable — Graff Wants Help.

Lincoln, Jan. 16.—(Special.)—Although the extreme heat cut the state fair attendance in 1922 to below the record, last year's Nebraska exposition was nevertheless a big success, Secretary E. R. Danielson told the Nebraska state board of agriculture in his annual report. Mr. Danielson suggested particularly that the state fair should be made attractive to the younger generation. He outlined the balanced program of educational and recreational activities of the fair and urged further development of the part that appeals to the coming generation.

High Court Sustains Billings' Sentence

Lincoln, Jan. 16.—(Special.)—Evidence which the defense contended was inadmissible in an unlawful manner is ruled inadmissible by the supreme court which today affirmed the sentence of Charles Billings who was given a fine of \$500 and 30 days jail term on a liquor charge in Antelope county.

HOUSE BILLS. H. R. 113, Gordon—Making it unlawful for any railroad company to operate any freight train exceeding 2,640 feet in length exclusive of locomotive and caboose. Penalty \$100 to \$500 for each offense.

S. F. 59, Good—To amend the law for the inspection of stock shipments to include removal of livestock from one county to another.
