Prince Exiled From Greece Arrives in United States

New York, Jan. 18.—Prince Andrew of Greece, who was sentenced to perpetual exile after his superiors in the Greek army annihilated by the Turks had been put to death, arrived on the Olympic, accompanied by his wife, Princess Alice, cousin of the prince of Wales.

Prince Andrew, a brother of the late King Constantine, said the present government of Greece was a military dictatorship and declared it could not long avoid a general election in which, he asserted, it probably would be overthrown.

Freshman Shoots Would-Be Hazer

So Coast U. Decides Hazing Hereafter Must Be With Consent of "Hazees."

Los Angeles, Jan. 18.—"Denatured" hazing, as Dr. Rufus B. Von Kleinsmid, president of the University of Southern California, termed it, or hazing with the consent of the "hazees," is the only kind which will be permitted at that institution hereafter.

That announcement came close after a meeting of faculty and student authorities which considered the case of Phillip Johnston, sophomore, who was shot in the head when he and a number of others attempted to haze P. A. Banks, freshman, who had previously been "warned" by upper classmen not to appear again on the campus without his green-and-red class cap.

Banks, a resident of Riverside, Cal., 29, and married, was held by the police on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon. Police surgeons pronounced Johnston's wound slight.

"Hazing as now carried on here, it was agreed by faculty and student representatives, contains certain elements of danger, despite the good feeling between the lower and upper classmen," said Dr. Von Kleinsmid. "Therefore, it must go. Hereafter, no lower classman will be hazed, if he expresses disinclination to the procedure."

The procedure used by the upper classmen, who sought to haze Banks, was to bind the victims with ropes, turn the hose on them and then give them "mud baths," it was stated.

Jewish Leaders to Discuss Reconstruction Problems

Chicago, Jan. 18.—Jewish reconstruction problems in Palestine will be discussed at a conference of midwestern and Pacific coast Jewish leaders, to be held at Denver, March 6 and 7, it was announced, following a meeting of Jewish leaders here.

Five hundred delegates are expected to attend, and senate leaders who favored the resolution passed there, favoring Palestine as the homeland

of the Jewish race will be invited to speak.

The states to be represented at the convention are Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, Kansas, Texas, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, North Dakota, South Dakota, Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Utah, Nevada, California, Oregon and Washington.

Mail Bandit Captured in Attempt to Rob Train

Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 18.—A bandit was shot and captured last night in an attempt to rob the mail car of eastbound Santa Fe train No. 6 between Lawrence and Holliday, Kan. The bandit entered the mail car, from the blinds, according to mail clerks, and ordered them to "stick 'em up." Chief Clerk Jack Marvin fired twice, both shots taking effect.

French Ambushed in Morocco

Paris, Jan. 18.—A report that a French detachment had been ambushed at Taza, French Morocco, was confirmed by the ministry of war today. The losses were two French officers and 12 men killed and nine men wounded. The French troops were attacked by surprise in a ravine by a band of insurgents.

Big Combine of Theaters Brews

Erlanger and Shuberts in Deal to Merge Most of Houses in U. S.

New York, Jan. 18.—The biggest theater combine ever attempted in the United States has been virtually completed, according to a statement last night. A vast majority of theaters in New York and throughout the country will pass under one control, thereby creating something like a monopoly of houses in which legitimate enterprise can find homes.

According to A. L. Erlanger, who admitted the deal was under way the principal factors in the combine will be himself and the Shuberts.

The talk in the theatrical district was of an even more sweeping merger of interests whereby some of the few remaining independent theaters would be found allied with Erlanger and the Shuberts so that the would be producer would find

himself forced to seek in a single office an outlet for his productions.

Mr. Erlanger volunteered the information that Charles P. Dillingham, with his three big theaters, the Hippodrome, the Gayety and the Globe, is expected to be a party to the realty merger.

The plan has three new features, the greatest innovation being that the public is to be let in on it. The amount involved in the deal it is said, will reach approximately \$50,000,000 and to finance it the public is to be let in. No details of the stock selling feature of the enterprise were available last night, but both Mr. Erlanger and Lee Shubert admitted the public was to be invited to invest freely.

Mr. Shubert minimized the assertion of Mr. Erlanger that the deal virtually had been completed. He insisted the Shuberts had not audited their books as yet to determine the extent of consideration they would demand in return for participation in such combine.

Ship Searched for Bergdoll; Two Members of Crew Held

Jacksonville, Fla., Jan. 18.—Department of Justice agents who yesterday boarded the German steamer Deutschland as it passed the bar here in search of Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, draft evader, are holding two of the members of the crew as "suspicious characters."

The men gave their names as Ernest Threkkow, 43, and Albert Hoerstell, 37.

Their fingerprints and photographs were taken and forwarded to Washington for comparison with Bergdoll's. One of the agents said he did not believe either would prove to be Bergdoll, but he was taking no chances.
