

### French Cavalry Halts Near Riot Around Hotel

#### Mounted Troops Disperse Angry Crowds on Streets of Mayence After Small Disturbance.

Mayence, Jan. 25.—Riots and killings were narrowly averted here to night when huge crowds of angry Germans ran amuck in the streets because fines were imposed on the Ruhr magnates.

French cavalry finally dispersed the rioters and is now patrolling the city. Thousands of Germans, mostly youths, began marching through the streets singing patriotic songs about 8. The objective of all was the hotels where the French officers are quartered.

In front of the Holland hotel the crowd spied two French infantry officers and began booing. Hotel officers succeeded in saving them from molestation. A score of French officers were in the dining room at the time.

Attempting to follow the two young officers the rioters broke the glass doors of the hotel and some of the bravest ventured inside, returning with palms and shrubs as trophies, at which the crowd hurrahs.

Some Germans climbed to the windows of the office of the porter where there were some French officers. The rioters insulted the officers to their faces but the latter ignored them, keeping remarkably cool. Hotel employees again saved the Frenchmen.

The crowds took up the march, singing "Victory Over France," but on seeing a French officer alight from a street car with his wife they did not molest them.

A few minutes later, while passing the Hotel Grande Bretagne, the rioters, angered by French and British flags under a glass case in front of the hotel, smashed the case and also 12 windows.

The alarm had been given at the French barracks by this time, however, and a squadron of cavalry cantered up the street, followed by other cavalry patrols.

The crowds gradually dispersed before the troops and at midnight the city was quiet.

#### Would Increase Salaries

Lincoln, Jan. 25.—(Special.)—Senator Gumb today introduced a bill in the state senate which will increase the salaries of county attorneys in counties of from 15,000 to 20,000 population. The bill applies particularly to Dodge county. It contains the same provision for an increase in the pay of sheriffs.

#### My Aid France.

London, Jan. 25.—A semi-official news agency in Berlin has information from Warsaw that the Polish war minister has ordered men of the Polish and German armies, whose service time has expired and who are familiar with the operation of railroads, mines, smelting works and postal services, to hold themselves at the disposal of the French government, says a Reuters dispatch.

#### Over German Police.

Mayence, Jan. 25.—(By A. P.)—General Mareschal, commanding French post here, today issued a proclamation declaring henceforth all local German police would be under the authority

of the French military. This step, the proclamation said, was taken because the authorities failed to make any effort to repress the demonstration yesterday that followed the conviction of the German mine directors.

#### White Declares Proposed Packer Merger Not Monopoly

Wichita, Kan., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—Morris & Co. with Armour & Co. should not be considered as monopoly, viewed impartially, F. Edson White, president of Armour & Co., said today, in addressing the Kansas National Livestock associations, in session here. White said that such a combination would mean a greater capacity and a cheaper commodity for consumers.

The accident occurred at Forty-third and Center streets. Poindexter, who received bruises and abrasions, was unable to give officers a lucid explanation of how he was hurt. He is in a hospital.
