New Armour Head Arrives in Omaha on Inspection Trip

F. Edson White Expresses Gratification at Feeling of Mutuality Between Producer and Packer.

"I was delighted to find the feeling of mutuality between the producer and the packer," was the first comment of F. Edson White, newly-elected president of the Armour Packing company, on his arrival in Omaha yesterday afternoon with Lester Armour, a vice president of the company.

"We have been to Kansas City and Wichita, where we attended the convention of the Kansas Livestock association," continued Mr. White. "There is every evidence that the livestock man is coming into his own, slowly but surely, and probably on a more conservative and satisfactory basis."

Mum on Morris Merger. Mr. White declined to comment on the proposed purchase by the Armour company of the Morris & Co., a deal yet to be consummated.

Mr. White, who was met by Oakley C. Willis, general manager of the Armour plant in South Omaha, is but 49 years old. Incidentally, he now is "boss" of the concern which "out modernized" and put his father out of the packing business when it started a line of refrigerator cars for the transportation of dressed beef, some 30 years ago. His father, a small packer at Peoria, Ill., could not meet the competition and withdrew.

Works on Farm.

Besides being a member of several of Chicago's most exclusive clubs, Mr. White maintains a farm on which he often does actual farm work during the summer months. He keeps it on a "paying" basis, too. He attributes his success, which has made him head of the largest meat packing concern in the world, most of all, to his wife. The congratulations of his 15-year-old son, "Eddy," were the most delightful of all to him, he says, when news of his promotion was made known.

"I would advise the young man who wishes to succeed not to remain in a job he doesn't like. Let him look into his soul and decide what he wants to do, then find a job that comes the nearest to suiting him," said Mr. White.

Began at Bottom.

Mr. White literally began at the bottom of the packing business and worked in various departments as laborer, packer, and checker. He was asked concerning labor matters he said: "Labor in the packing industry is in excellent condition. Establishment of conference boards has tended to show the workers that their employers have consideration for them, and that the workers also should have consideration for the employers."

Mr. White and Mr. Armour, who is a nephew of J. Ogden Armour, now chairman of the board of directors, went with General Manager Willis to the Armour plant here, before leaving for Chicago last night.

When F. Edson White left public schools at Peoria, Ill., he obtained a job in a packing house in that city. Later he gave up a \$70 a week position in a San Francisco packing plant to take a job with Armour & Co. in Chicago at \$25 a week with a view to winning advancement in the packing industry. Today, at less than 50, he is president of Armour & Co., one of the largest packing industries in the world, at a salary said to be in excess of \$100,000 a year. The business of the interests he directs amounts to more than \$1,000,000,000 yearly. If the proposed purchase of Morris & Co. is completed White will head the greatest packing industry ever created.

Omaha Ministers Divided in Views on Grant Mixup

Majority Believe Dissenting Churchman Should Resign From Faith With Which He Can't Agree.

Leading Omaha ministers were almost unanimous Friday in their opinion that Rev. Percy Stockey Grant of New York should leave the Episcopal church if he cannot conform to its doctrine. Doctor Grant recently denied the deity of Christ. Bishop Manning of New York requested that he either withdraw his statements or resign. In a letter, which Doctor Grant made public Thursday he did not refer to either. Below are statements made by Omaha ministers.

Bishop E. V. Shaylor: "It is easy to be a martyr for unfaith's sake. A man wins some applause for a season and then drops into the gloom of separation." Rev. O. D. Baltzly: "He ought to be put out of the church immediately. The Christian church is based upon the deity of Christ and a minister who departs from that faith has no place in the church."

Encourages View. Rev. Ralph Bailey, of the First Unitarian church: "We encourage and applaud his views. I think that if,

after his frank statement of his views, the church of the Ascension still wants him to remain in their pulpit he is justified in staying there. The Unitarian church is thoroughly in accord with his ideas on the deity of Christ, and we believe they constitute a real gospel." Doctor Edwin Hart Jenks: "If a man is not in sympathy with the teaching of the church there is only one thing to do—leave the church. It is not a question of personal liberty of conscience—a man should not accept a position in an organization with whose views he is not in accord." Should Quit Church.

Rev. A. F. Ernst: "I am not jumping on a man because he doesn't agree with me, but if a man belongs to a denomination, the whole of which shares a certain view, he must either subscribe to it or get out and be an independent."

Charles W. Savidge resigned from the Methodist church several years ago because he felt his views did not coincide with those of the church. "I was more strict, if anything," he said. "Bishop Manning's position is perfectly proper."
