Fred Lundin, Power Behind Mayor Thompson's Machine, and 23 Others Named in School Frauds.

Chicago, Jan. 29 .- Fred Lundin, former congressman and known as the silent power behind the political machine of Mayor William Hale Thompson, and 23 others were named in a blanket indictment returned in court today by the special grand jury which is investigating school board affairs. Virtus Rohm, Lundin's nephew, also

was among the indicted men who included several indicted previously by the same grand jury in connection with the administration of the school funds and property. The indictment contains a blanket

ispiracy charge and contains 24 Conspiracy Charged.

The third count of the indictment charged conspiracy to obtain \$1,000,000 from the city of Chicago, and the fifth count charged a conspiracy to obtain \$1,000,000 from the state. The 13th count charged conspiracy for vio lation of duty in allowing contracts to be let at the instance of Lundin, who with others was charged with sharing in the profits. The 15th count charged prevention of competition. The 16th charged that \$1,000,000 was diverted to the private use of various persons and firms by letting contracts and making purchases at exorbitant prices.

The true bill was returned before Chief Justice Michael L. McKinley of the criminal court, who set the bonds of the defendants at \$10,000 each. Mr. Lundin was reported to be in Cuba and Mr. Rohm was recently re ported to be in Los Angeles. Enormous Business.

Coblenz, Jan. 29 .- (By A. P.)-Seven of the most influential newspapers in the occupied territory have been ordered by the Rhineland high commission to suspend for periods rangeing from one to 10 days for publication of articles deemed prejudicial to public order.

In addition, a number of German newspapers printed in unoccupied Germany are forbidden the right to circulate in the Rhineland for periods ranging from one to three months.

Assemblages are forbidden by an ordinance posted in all the cities, but crowds continued to gather nightly singing "Deutschland Uber Alles." A large demonstration was staged Sunsocialist newspaper, Rhennische Wort. The demonstrants were dispersed by
