Customs Collections

for January Increase Washington, Feb. 2 .- Predictions by customs officials that tariff duties collected in January would exceed \$46,000,000 have been borne out by final computation of collections for the month, made public at the trea-

gury. Collections for the month totaled \$46,345,991, an increase over December of about \$7,000,000.

The continued increase since the new tariff act went into operation last September, has been the basis for estimates by customs authorities and treasury officials that customs receipts during the fiscal year would amount to \$480,000,000.

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
