

### New York Social Stars Sentenced on Liquor Charge

La Montagne Brothers, Distillers, Get Jail Terms and Fines for Violating Volstead Law.

New York, Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Jail sentences for bootlegging were imposed on the four La Montagne brothers, distillers, all of them socially prominent and one internationally known as a polo player. Bail of \$15,000 each was granted until Thursday, that they might wind up their business affairs before entering the Essex county (New Jersey) penitentiary.

The quartet recently was indicted by a federal grand jury which investigated a dinner at the fashionable Racquet and Tennis club on Park avenue, at which liquor was alleged to have flown freely. The charges against the brothers were conspiring to violate the Volstead act and defrauding the government of taxes through removal of liquor from bond on forged permits.

Charged with having released 30,000 gallons of liquor, the brothers at first entered pleas of not guilty to both charges against them. Today, however, they changed their pleas to guilty.

Montague La Montagne, president of the corporation, was sentenced to two months in jail and fined \$2,000. Four months in jail and fines of \$2,000 each were imposed on the other three—Rene M., the polo player; Morgan E., and William A.

In presenting the case of Montague to Judge Winslow, United States Attorney Hayward said he thought he deserved some leniency. Montague was in France on business when the offenses were committed, but admitted general knowledge of them.

Distinguished lawyers appeared in court to plead for the brothers.

### Dairymen at North Loup Increase Price of Milk

North Loup, Neb., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Robert Van Horn, Alpha L. Crandall and Ralph J. Comstock, dairymen, who supply the local demand for milk and cream, have jointly notified their consumers that the price of milk will be hereafter 10 cents a quart instead of 9 cents as formerly. It is explained that this is made necessary by the increased cost of feed.

Scottsbluff, Neb., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Scottsbluff will have an automobile show, its first, February 22, 23 and 24.
