Under this plan there would have been four South Dakota clubs, Aberdeen, Watertown, Sloux Falls and Mitchell and four of the "Whitey Gislason

George Segrist, owner of the Fairbury franchise was present but stated that he would not take charge of the club there until the Fairbury fans met his proposition.
