Five Chicago Packers Lost \$60,000,000 in 1921

Chicago, Feb. 21.—The five Chicago packers lost an aggregate of about \$60,000,000 in 1921, according to statements made by L. D. H. Weld, formerly of Yale university but now head of the commercial research department of a large packing concern, in a speech at the University of Chicago last night.

Disease Closes Bluffs Schools

Eight Hundred Pupils and 15 Teachers Stricken by Grip Epidemic. As a result of the ravages of the gripe in Council Bluffs, taking more than 800 pupils and 15 teachers of the public schools, the schools were closed temporarily at the close of sessions yesterday afternoon, it was announced yesterday. They will not reopen until next Monday, it was said, and if the epidemic continues to spread, may be closed for a longer time. Approximately 5,000 children are enrolled in the public schools of the city, and 280 teachers are employed.
