Airedale Dog, Sold and Taken to St. Joseph, Mo., Walks 700 Miles Back to Former Master in Denver.

Fixed for Life. Denver, Colo., Feb. 23.—A large Airedale dog, shipped from here by its owner, Frank Farrow, three weeks ago to St. Joseph, Mo., limped back to the Farrow home yesterday, having walked the entire 700 miles from the Missouri city. The owner of the dog in St. Joseph, to whom it was sold by Farrow, reported that it disappeared a week ago. Farrow, who said the Airedale had become unmanageable, asserted he would pay its board at a local kennel the rest of its life.

A Stowaway For Love.

Boston, Feb. 23.—Terrific storms encountered by the shipping board steamer Bellingham, which arrived yesterday from Raumo, Finland, drove five stowaways from their hiding places during the voyage, but a sixth, a comely 19-year-old Finnish girl, remained hidden until yesterday when the steamer was near the Boston.

The girl, Bertha Lane, told the captain that when the vessel was frozen in the ice at Raumo, she met in a cafe, A. Alvarez, a Porto Rican fireman of the steamer, and they fell in love. She decided to stowaway on her lover's ship.

At dead of night she made her way over the ice on Raumo harbor more than a mile, climbed aboard, found Alvarez and took up her abode in the fireman's forecastle. Other firemen became aware of her presence, but remained silent. For two months, while the Bellingham was encountering storms of such fury that the ship's superstructure was damaged and one sailor washed overboard and lost, the girl covered in the forecastle hardly daring to move. Bertha wept yesterday when she was separated from her lover. Alvarez assured her that they would be married no matter what happened.

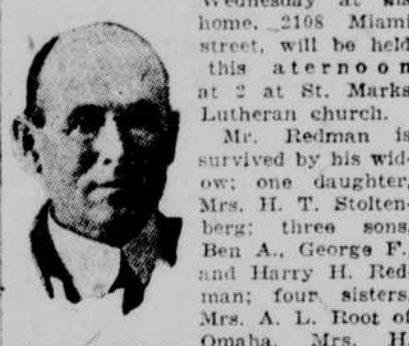

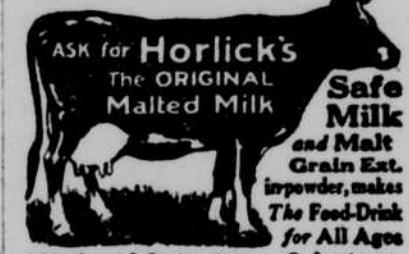
Thief Gives Owner Advice

Japs Can't Reach Postoffice Boxes

Postmaster at Honolulu in Hot Water With Oriental Population.

Honolulu, Feb. 23.—Honolulu's Japanese population has a new grievance. They don't like the magnificent new postoffice, probably the only "out-door" postoffice in the world. They don't like the building because they can't reach the boxes, which, they complain, are built too high for people of short stature. If a box above the first two tiers is given them they cannot reach their mail. "Many Japanese have complained to me about the height of the boxes,"

said Postmaster MacAdam, who, although he didn't draw the plans for the building and isn't responsible for the inconvenient height of some of the boxes for short people, is the great. The new postoffice, opposite the capitol, is a beautiful white building set back from the street. Most of the business with the public is transacted practically in the open, for the mail boxes and windows for stamps, parcel post, general delivery, etc. face on a wide open portico. The columns and arches of the portico give the building an architectural finish of real beauty.

The wise ones are suggesting to the harassed postmaster that he lay in a supply of small folding ladders and rent them out at a small fee to short boxholders.
